

Notre Dame Team Humiliates Duke

Notre Dame and Michigan State, having disposed of the last of their warm-up opponents, now can concentrate on the ultimate test—each other.

The No. 1 Irish and second-ranked Spartans meet next Saturday at East Lansing, Mich. In the most climactic U.S. college football game in recent years. Both have been at the top of The Associated Press rankings since the beginning of the season and neither did anything to jeopardize the ranking Saturday.

Notre Dame scored on the second play of the game and went on to humiliate Duke 64-0.

Michigan State scored 23 points in the second quarter in defeat—37-19.

The Irish scored six times in the first half as sophomore quarterback Terry Hanratty completed eight of 13 passes for 127 yards and two touchdowns.

Michigan State's Jimmy Raye put on a passing display of his own, completing seven of nine passes for 171 yards and three touchdowns.

BEATS STANFORD
In the other major game next Saturday, UCLA, No. 8, meets Southern California, No. 7. The Bruins beat Stanford 10-7 Saturday, but suffered a major blow when quarterback Gary Deban cracked an ankle bone.

UCLA must beat Southern California, which did not play last week, to remain in contention for the Rose Bowl. A UCLA victory would tie both teams for the Pacific championship and conference officials would decide the bowl participant.

Third-ranked Alabama rolled over South Carolina 24-0 for its 13th straight victory. It was South Carolina's eighth loss in six games.

Purdue just about clinched a Rose Bowl bid by beating Minnesota 16-0. Illinois, which beat

Northwestern 40-14, could still tie the Boilermakers for second place in the Big Ten, but officials would probably make Purdue the conference representative because it has never gone to the Bowl. Michigan State, already the conference champion, is ineligible because of its participation last season.

Whitlock Fires 2 Goals

HALIFAX (CP) — Halifax Junior Canadiens shelved Sorel netminder Ed Lacelle with 56 shots Sunday to take a 9-3 exhibition victory over the Quebec Provincial League Black Hawks and extend their unbeaten streak to 13 games.

The Canadiens, now with 10 consecutive wins against junior competition, handled over just as easily Saturday night with a 7-4 decision in a game shortened by three minutes, six seconds when fans got out of control.

Paced by Bobby Sheehan's three goals and two by Bobby Whitlock, Halifax held a slim 3-2 lead after the opening period Sunday, then poured five unanswered goals past Lacelle in the second period to put the game out of reach.

The teams traded goals in the third period.

Ken Brown, Rod Bossy, Brian Redden and Fred Harvey were the other Halifax scorers, while Serge Bernier, Ed Parr and Jocelyn Bordeless scored for Sorel.

HAMILTON (CP) — Russ Jackson, passing brilliantly, manoeuvred Ottawa Rough Riders to a lopsided 30-1 victory over Hamilton Tiger-Cats Sunday, giving Rough Riders a 30-point lead in the two-game, total-point final for the Eastern Football Conference championship.

The defeat left Hamilton with a 29-point deficit facing them when they take the field in the second game in Montreal next Saturday.

The Hamilton crowd reacted as if the Grey Cup were at stake. Fans invaded the field twice during the game.

One spectator seized the ball and passed it down the field before being ejected.

As the final gun sounded, fans tore down one set of goal posts. Ottawa got touchdowns from Bo Scott, Jim Dillard and Ted Watkins. Moe Racine, EFC scoring champion, picked up two field goals, three singles and three converts.

ZUGER SCORED SINGLE
Hamilton, held off the scoreboard until the fourth quarter, got a single on a kick by quarterback Joe Zuger.

Ottawa overpowered Hamilton in every department, rolling up 24 first downs to six and outrushing the Tiger-Cats 167 yards to 32. In passing, Jackson was good on 22 of 29 for 215 yards with Zuger and Frank Cosentino clicking on only eight of 20 for 109 yards.

Bruins, Rangers, Hawks Win Games Sunday Night

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Bruins handed Montreal Canadiens, defending Stanley Cup champions, a fourth straight defeat Sunday night, edging them 3-1 on defenceman Teddy Green's unassisted goal in the third period.

Green intercepted an attempted clearing pass by Montreal defenceman Terry Harper and rifled a 50-foot screen shot past goalie Charlie Hodge for his first goal of the season.

The goal broke up a tremendous duel between Hodge and Boston netminder Gerry Cheevers who has led the Bruins to two victories and a tie since being recalled from Oklahoma City of the Central League a week ago.

The defeat dropped the injury-plagued Canadiens into the NHL cellar, one point behind the hustling Bruins.

Montreal jumped off to a 1-0 lead when Henri Richard converted a pass from Claude Provoost at 14:20 of the opening period.

Ron Murphy tied the count at 19:08 on a long shot. The 100 teams battled scorelessly until Green connected to the cheers of a packed crowd of 13,909, the fifth sellout in Boston's six home games.

NEW YORK (AP) — Earl Ingarfield and Reg Fleming each scored two goals, leading New York Rangers to a 5-2 victory over Detroit Red Wings Sunday night in a wild National Hockey League game.

The game was delayed 17 minutes late in the second period by a slugfest involving every player on the ice except goalies. Jim Neilson of the Rangers and the Red Wings' Bob McCord, who did most of

the heavy hitting, were ejected from the game.

The Rangers wrapped up their victory on third-period goals by Rod Gilbert and Fleming. Gilbert scored into an open net with 3 1/2 minutes to play when goalie Roger Crozier left the cage to cover a shot off the boards and the puck rebounded past him.

Fleming tallied his second goal less than two minutes later with Ingarfield and Boom Boom Geoffrion assisting on the play.

Ingarfield's second goal, with 12:08 gone in the second period, sent the Rangers ahead 3-1, but the Wings closed the gap just 41 seconds later, Dean Prentice drilling home Alex Delvecchio's rebound.

Saskatchewan Scores Win To Capture Lead In Final

REGINA (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders with a first-quarter scoring spree and a strong defensive game defeated Winnipeg Blue Bombers 14-7 Sunday to take a one-game lead in the best-of-three Western Football Conference final.

More than 14,000 fans braved 10-degree weather to watch Saskatchewan take an 11-0 first quarter lead, extend the margin to 14-0 at the half. Winnipeg managed its only touchdown about the halfway mark of the fourth quarter after the teams played a scoreless third quarter.

Saskatchewan's lone touchdown was scored by Gord Barwell. Jack Abendschan kicked two field goals, a convert and a single.

Winnipeg's touchdown came one play after a kick by Saskatchewan about the halfway mark in the final quarter when

quarterback Kenny Ploen threw 57 yards to Bill Cooper. Norm Winton kicked the convert.

Roughriders, with a strong defence, held off a late Winnipeg rally. Both clubs used a variety of footwear, tennis shoes, regular cleats and rubber cleats on the frozen field.

CONCEDED POINT
Cooper conceded a single point on Jack Abendschan's field goal attempt from the Bomber 38 early in the first quarter and after Winnipeg was forced to kick, Lancaster moved the ball 56 yards in seven plays for the touchdown.

It came on an 11-yard pass to Barwell from Bombers' 13-yard line.

Lancaster moved Saskatchewan from the 49-yard line to the Winnipeg 30 in five plays setting up Abendschan's field goal.

Winnipeg moved the ball into Saskatchewan territory for the first time at 3:22 of the second quarter but a series of penalties nullified a march.

Starting at Saskatchewan's 44, Ploen passed to Marty Rosen for 14 yards but had to move back on two successive penalties, blocking from the rear and holding to the Saskatchewan 48. Ploen was thrown for a nine-yard loss on the next play and threw incomplete to Rosen before Ed Ulmer was forced to punt.

Neither team fumbled despite the cold temperature with Winnipeg taking 10 penalties for 74 yards and Saskatchewan lost 124 yards on 14 penalties.

Dave Raimy was Ploen's workhorse, receiving five of six passes for 50 yards. Bill Cooper caught all three tossed to him for 64 yards and Rosen made 60 yards on three completed pass receptions.

Hugh Campbell was Lancaster's choice only twice, was good on both but only made 37 yards. Jim Worden caught two of two for 34 yards.

In rushing Saskatchewan held a big edge with 119 yards compared with Bombers' 43. George Reed carried 18 times for 51 yards and Alan Ford ran nine times for 48 yards.

Raimy carried nine times for 47 yards to lead Winnipeg's ground attack while Art Perkins made 14 yards on seven carries.

Ploen completed 11 of 26 passes tried while Lancaster, who completed six of seven in the first half, was good on eight of 14 passes.
