- 1 cup white sugar
  - 4 tbs. butter
  - 3 tbs. cocoa
  - 3/4 cup boiling water
  - 1 3/4 cup sifted flour
  - 7/8 tsp. baking soda
  - 1 tsp. baking powder, little salt
  - 1 tsp. vanilla.
- Cream butter, sugar together, pour boiling water over cocoa, mix with first mixture, sift in dry ingredients, add 1 cup of milk. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes in 375 degree oven or until done.

### Elegance Is In Style

Elegance emerges as the keynote of new model room displays. This is evident in both traditional and contemporary decor.

Gibrant color and a new feeling for fine accessories, coupled with the practical side of things, makes doing a room and keeping it in order a joy. Exquisite wallpapers add their quota of color and since many of them are washable, their charms will not fade.

More trim is being used than formerly and tassels, braid, fringe show up on draperies and furniture. The right handling of this type of trimming keeps it from looking fussy.

For instance, one decorator uses black soutache braid and dressmaker braid "frogs" to ornament a red felt bedspread. Then there are draw draperies and bedspreads with multi-colored worsted tassels. This idea was used in a room with a huge black wrought iron bed, set on a raised platform of white vinyl tile and flanked on either side by two large and imposing gold metal lanterns.

As examples of new trends in accessorizing, we might cite a table top of tile that exactly matches the floral design of a sofa covering. Modernists will applaud the idea of metal mesh doors and those who prefer traditional settings will like the pretty paperweight doorknobs.
