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Interesting Talks At Meeting Of S' Side RCAF Wing

The members of the Summerside wing of the R.C.A.F. Association had the pleasure of hearing two very interesting speakers at their meeting last evening in the persons of Wing Commander J. W. Reid, D.F.C., commanding officer of No. 401 City of Westminster Reserve Squadron and Squadron Leader N. J. Everard, D.F.C., a flight commander in the same squadron. W.C. Reid who in civilian life is with Trans Canada Airlines explained the workings of a reserve squadron which he said must be always prepared to respond if called on, without pause. They meet two nights a week and fly at week-ends from St. Hubert airport. He explained that when the reserve squadrons were first formed they were to be the first line of defence as they were only fighter squadrons but now there are, in addition, four active fighter squadrons.

He said that they were having an excellent summer camp at Summerside and to date the squadron has put in 550 flying hours and this is considerable, he explained, as the maximum endurance of each flight in a Vampire Jet is one hour and fifteen minutes. Squadron Leader Everard is a test pilot with the Canadian Aircraft Company which is manufacturing the F-86 jet fighter. He gave a detailed technical explanation of the principle of jet propulsion and said that the Vampire Jet flies at a speed of from 350 to 400 miles an hour with a ceiling of 35,000 feet. He was very enthusiastic about the F-86 and said it was a magnificent aircraft and would be able to do a good job in protecting Canada. He said that the pilots in the reserve squadrons are all doing a splendid job.

The president of the wing, Mr. G. M. Mulholland presided and during the business session the following reports were given: Air cadets, Roy Johnston; member ship, Donald MacLean; canteen, Cyril Hickey; flying club, Arthur Rogers; sponsored show, Norman Hoeg.

shack and this was in 1946. He said that Arsenault's record was not as bad as it sounded and explained some of the circumstances. He asked that sentences be imposed in the light of the recommendations of the jury for mercy. When court convened in the morning the jury was addressed by the Attorney-General on behalf of the Crown and by Mr. McPhee for the defence.

In his charge Mr. Justice McGuigan said that the case was comparatively simple but important as the charge was a serious offence. The essential element of the charge, he explained, is that the accused together, used violence or threats of violence and robbed the complainant of about \$40.

He advised them of the principle of British law by which every person is innocent until proven guilty and said that the burden of proof is on the Crown and the accused must get the benefit of any doubt, but it must be a reasonable doubt. He reviewed the evidence and said that Roy Ford, the complainant, impressed him as careful and

trustworthy. The question of whether the two accused were together should not give the jury much difficulty he thought, as they were seen. There was no doubt but that violence was used on Ford. He said that the matter of identity was a question of fact for the jury to decide. However, Ford had good opportunity to observe them and gave a good description of them and identified them in the Police Court. His evidence is not contradicted.

Mr. Justice MacGuigan said "in my opinion it was the accused who attacked Ford but you may not agree with my view. That is your privilege." With reference to robbery, he said that if the jury agreed that the accused assaulted Ford they should have no difficulty on the point of robbery as there must have been a motive for the assault.

The jury retired at 12:27 and returned at 1:22. Mr. J. Harold Goodwin assisted in the prosecution. The jury members were: Angus MacLennan, foreman, Ira Barlow, Hubert D.
