Stage Set For Continued from page 1 about 5 A. M. E. T. The Pope's selection of new cardinals shows the broadening of the Church's battle. For the first time India will have a member of the Sacred College, and so will the Western United States in Archbishop James Francis McIntyre of Los Angeles. Msgr. Aleriano Gracias, Bishop of Bombay, was put forward to replace a Western nominee who died Dec. 28.

Three more are Latin Americans — an area for which the Pope has repeatedly expressed his concern. At least six of the 10 new Italian cardinals will be assigned to the Roman Curia, the Pontiff's "general staff" which directs and co-ordinates Vatican activities. The appointment of these new "ambassadors of the Catholic Church" will bring the Sacred College up to its full strength of 70 for the first time in more than a century.

The full College of Cardinals — whose average age is 64 — will meet together for the first time Thursday. After that it is probable that most of them will not see each other again till after the Pope dies.

For in addition to helping the Pope direct the course of the world's 400,000,000 Catholics, the Sacred College also has the task of electing one of its own number to succeed him.

The full college will contain cardinals from 27 countries. There will be 26 Italian and 44 non-Italian cardinals.

In addition to Msgr. Leger, Canada already has James Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto.

Papal Law Continued from page 1 "the cruel wars of this century" which have "weakened the physical constitution and health of men not a little."

The law became effective today with the publication in the Vatican's official Acta Apostolicae Sedis (acts of the apostolic see).

The Pontiff's law emphasized, however, that the Eucharistic fast — with the exception of the now general rule on ordinary water — should be observed in its full vigor by all who can do so.

The sick, either priests or lay persons, even if not confined to bed, may take something in liquid form or true medicine, but not alcoholic drinks. "The simple faithful," said the official summary, "should have the judgment of a confessor before taking advantage of this rule."

Even those who are not sick, but who would be gravely inconvenienced by a normal fast before receiving the Eucharist may, with the advice of their confessor, take something in the form of liquid, but not alcohol. They must, however, abstain for at least one hour before receiving communion.

Examples of persons who might be subjected to inconvenience by normal fast include persons engaged in public services, transportation, port duties, nurses in hospitals.

Exception is also made in the case of long journeys on foot to go to church. These must be at least 1-4 miles.

The Pope's law ruled that Bishops may — under circumstances when it might be necessary or propitious — permit mass to be celebrated in the evening, after 4 P.M. instead of in the morning, as normally required.
