



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Old Home Week fever hit this city last Saturday when practically all the horses from the mainland and most of the locals were stabled at the Charlotteville track. By Monday morning the track had grown to over 200, probably the largest number of race horses ever set for a campaign in the Maritime provinces. Practically all the top horses were here to race for the big money in the free-for-alls, senior and junior and the free for all trot and on Sunday afternoon crowds made their appearance as usual, bringing their children with them to look at the horses and at nearly all the stables there was somebody who would show them the horses and tell their names. This has always been one of the most interesting features of this great get together.

The old-timers who have been racing here for years are more numerous than you might expect, one of them, Heber Sweeney, who has held track records with Toll Gate and won many races over our oval, met with a great disappointment. At the Harrisburg sale he bought the trotting stallion Newport Express 2:04 2-5, had him carefully prepared by Ronnie McAliduff and in one of his races at Sackville Downs he was a 2:10 3-5 and later at Charlottetown was time a mile around 2:08. From his showing it was expected that he might lower the track trotting record of 2:07 1-2 set by Watchin. Just about an hour before the races on Tuesday Newport Express took ill and despite the skill of the best veterinarians he died. This is a severe blow and all the horsemen feel the greatest sympathy for Mr. Sweeney in his loss.

The week's program got under way on Monday night with a junior free for all, free for all and 3-year-old class. It was probably one of the best programs in the Maritime since Harry Janelle, owned by Daley, won the Bridgewater, N.S. and driven by him, winning the first and third dashes in the Junior Free For All in 2:10 4-5, 2:12 1-5—the former a new record. My Vol, driven by Joe Hennessey, won the second dash in 2:12 1-5 and Taurida Bay (C. Smith) was 2-3-2. The Free for All of course attracted the greatest attention because of the presence of Convar 2:01, one of the highest priced horses brought to the Maritimes in years, also Newport Chief 1:59 3-5, Dave Grattan 2:05 that set up a new track record at Moncton of 2:05 in winning the Monctonian \$3,000

stake, also other stars. Convar, owned by Harry Hirsch, Sydney, and driven by George Mauger, was 1-3-1. To the surprise of many Convar's opposition came from Ann's Dream, owned by J.K. Curran, Summerside, and driven by Cruse Robinson that finished 2-1-3 with the ever tough Josedale Clansman (Don Turner 5-2-2. Time, 2:06 4-5, 2:08, 2:07. The track record is 2:05 1-1.

Personally, the biggest surprise of the night was in the three year old class. We expected Mr. Rock that took a 2-year-old record of 2:08 1-5 would be an easy winner. Instead of that Vivien M., owned by J.A. MacNeill, Summerside and driven by George Sobey, led Mr. Rock to the quarter in :30 3-5 and to the half in 1:02 4-5. They were so far ahead that they looked like sure winners but Don Seaman, driving Just Betty's Mark, owned by Mrs. Don Seaman, was going an even rated mile and caught up to them before they hit the wire, winning in 2:12 3-5 in a photo finish—a new record. Vivien M. was 2-2-1. Mr. Rock, owned by C. J. Walker, Lower Sackville, and driven by L. Walker, 3. In the final dash Mr. Rock won from Just Betty's Mark in 2:11 4-5 with Vivien M. 3.

Tuesday afternoon's program brought out the fastest trotters and some of the fastest pacers of the meet and there were many upsets. The Junior Free For All was a corker with Flaming Way, owned and driven by Lorne Letcher, Springhill, winning with 1-1-man, driving Just Betty's Mark, a 3-year-old, his winning time was 2:04 3-5 over a mile track. His dam is the famous race mare Jane Azoff 1:50 1-4, that was owned by C.H. Horton, Murray River and driven by the late Willard Kelly. Farsud, owned and driven by Don Turner, was 2-2-1. Time, 2:06 4-5, 2:06 3-5, 2:09. Don Turner is a remarkable man. This horse was a failure last year, his winnings being \$0, but this year he has won quite a number of firsts, then was reported injured but he didn't show anything very wrong when he had a summary like the above. Four trotters turned out for the Free For All Trot. One of them, Singing Sword 2:01 was expected to be a sure winner. However, it was the local Jerry A. Hanover, owned by Roy Bevan and driven by Archie Llewellyn, that captured the first dash in 2:12 with Scotland's Ace (MacGregor) 2, April Bud (O'Meara) won the middle dash with Jerry A.

"Will The Track Record Be Broken?" Is Big Question

The question racing fans are asking themselves today is not so much "who will win the big Free-For-All" as "will the track record be broken?"

The mark of 2:05 1-5, which has stood the assault of many great horses over a 20-year period, will be called upon to stand up to another assault of six of the finest race horses in the Maritimes when Ann's Dream, Sir Joseph, Josedale Clansman, Convar, Newport Chief and Dave Grattan hit the wire during what is hoped will be a warm, sunny afternoon.

There is considerable speculation among horsemen that the record will fall by the wayside when these fine pacers hit the homing stretch.

On Monday night of this week Convar was clocked in 2:06 4-5 which was a faster mile than even the great Bay State Pat would tramp over this track. Up to that date that time was the fastest recorded here this year.

Later in the week Flaming Way won a division of the Junior Free-For-All with a mark of 2:06 3-5 but Flaming Way will not be in the Free-For-All because his owner did not enter him in time.

The second last card of racing for this week will be rounded out with two other good races. Post time is 2:30.
