Dr. Dawson Burns, in an article in the London Times on "The National Drink Bill for 1894," states that last year the United Kingdom spent £1,325,728 in intoxicants, an average of £3,116-6-11 per head of the population.

Dr. Dawson Burns leaves out of sight the fact that almost four-fifths of the so-called drink bill is simply a contribution by the public to the revenue. As regards the very narrow balance, it should be remembered that the public gets what it wants and what it asks for, that there is no deception in the matter, and that the total expenditure is not anything like the amount which the public has been robbed of by the "Liberator" and other swindlers, which were vouchered by names of great sanctity.

What the Liberator scandals have to do with the national drink bill is not very clear; and as for the revenue part of the argument it is evident that whatever becomes of the money paid for intoxicants, the man who pays forfeits all control over it. It is not a national scandal, but a national shame to have to pay taxes for several hundred millions.

A writer in the Review of Reviews for March declares that he has found by travelling in England and Europe that respect for American law and American law is sadly waned within the last half dozen years. Not only is this true among the manufacturers of Bradford and the tin plate capitalists of Wales, who might be expected to harbor a grudge against America and whose slighting remarks could be easily accounted for, but the same spirit is observable in almost all circles.

The reason for this change of attitude towards America is not far to seek. Our financial difficulties and business failures and railway complications of the last few months have touched many Englishmen and Germans in their tenderest spot—their pocketbooks. Millions of dollars' worth of the stocks of the Atchafalaya, the Union Pacific System and the Northern Pacific are owned in Great Britain and Germany.

The Review of Reviews for March declares that the most characteristic thing about Cornell University is the spirit of freedom that prevails there, securing to her professors the utmost intellectual freedom and to her students self-government. Established in 1826, Cornell is a liberal-minded men like Ezra Cornell and Andrew D. White. Cornell broke away from the traditions that by defining the religious attitude of their instructors and prohibiting an elaborate code of rules for their students fettered other universities.

President Schurman believes that students attending a modern university should be treated as men rather than as subjects to be subjected to espionage like boys. His faith has been amply justified, for in spite of some foolish student outbreaks, the Cornell students as a body display more manliness, honor and loyalty to the good name of their Alma Mater than is usually found. The pride which they have in their independence is displayed by a memorial which was drawn up by the four class presidents after the recent decision of the Faculty not to forbid intercollegiate football, and signed by the great majority of the 1,700 students. The memorial includes this sentence: "We as a body of the best intellects and interests of the State are proud to be members of the Cornell Council, which is a recent outgrowth of the Cornell spirit of freedom."

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in the Clyde River Presbyterian Church on Wednesday, March 20th, at 3 o'clock p. m., and was constituted with devotional exercises by Rev. J. R. McKay, moderator pro tempore, with whom were present Rev. T. F. Fullerton and Mr. H. McMillan, elder.

Rev. W. T. D. Moss was associated. That portion of the minutes relating to the calling of the meeting was read, and the Presbytery proceeded in accordance therewith to the ordination and induction of Rev. J. G. McIvor into the pastoral charge of the church at Clyde River. Rev. J. G. McIvor received the edict had been duly served. After divine service, conducted by Rev. Mr. McKay, who preached from the words, "Blessed walk ye with God," Rev. Mr. Fullerton took the chair. He then narrated the steps, put the usual questions to which satisfactory answers were given, and by prayer and the laying on of hands on the part of the brethren, ordained and inducted Mr. McIvor to the pastoral charge of the congregation of West and Clyde Rivers. Rev. Mr. Fullerton addressed the minister, and Rev. Mr. Moss the people.

At the close the newly inducted minister's name was added to the roll of Presbytery, and was introduced to the session. The Presbytery then adjourned to meet in Zion Church, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, April 16th, at 11 a. m.

DR. DOYLE'S VISIT TO KELLY'S CROSS.

Rev. Dr. Doyle, of Vernon River, who has been spending a few days with P. A. McElmeel at Kelly's Cross, celebrated High Mass in St. Joseph's Church on Sunday the 24th inst. Before reading the gospel of the day the Rev. Dr. took occasion to express his pleasure at again meeting his old parishioners of DeSable. He was particularly pleased on driving through the parish to note the marked improvement and general prosperity of the place as evidenced by the many comfortable dwellings and commodious farm buildings that are to be seen on every hand, nearly all of which were built since his last visit. It was also a pleasure to him to compliment and congratulate his old parishioners and their esteemed pastor, Father McElmeel, on their beautiful new church, so far on the way to completion.

If the interior of their beautiful church was finished in keeping with its exterior appearance, of which he had no doubt, it would be the "gem of the diocese." He next referred, in touching words, to the many old familiar faces that he missed out of the congregation and earnestly hoped that the young men before him would worthily fill the places left vacant by their fathers, who the Rev. Doctor then proceeded to preach an impressive sermon from the Gospel of St. John, VI, 12, 13. It is worthy to say that Dr. Doyle has old time vigor or eloquence, and that his sermon was listened to with the greatest attention by the large congregation present. Neither need I remark that Dr. Doyle's old parishioners were delighted to see him as hale and hearty and as brimful of wit and humor as when he first came to the place away back in the seventies. I am safe in saying that, as he laid their old pastor an affectionate good-bye, their mental prayer was—"God bless Dr. Doyle; may his shadow never grow less!"

THE MANITOBA SCHOOLS.

The Resolutions Moved in the Matter by a Manitoba Protestant.

In the Manitoba legislature on the 27th of February Mr. James Fisher, member for Brandon, as President, introduced the following resolutions as regards the Manitoba schools. The speech from Winnipeg says that many Protestant members of the House supported him.

1. While this House is determined at all times to maintain in the fullest extent that the constitution warrants its exclusive power to make laws with respect to education, yet it recognizes that the highest judicial tribunal in the realm has recently decided that "such exclusive power is not absolute but limited," and that the limitation was embodied in the constitution as a "parliamentary compact" between the Dominion and the people resident in the province at the union for the protection, amongst other things, of the rights and privileges of the Roman Catholic minority in relation to education, including rights and privileges that were acquired by them since the union.

2. It has been adjudged by the same tribunal that the "rights and privileges of the Roman Catholic minority in relation to education which exist prior to 1890 have been affected" by the Public Schools Act of that year.

3. The same tribunal has further decided in the event which is now shadowed by this Legislature being called upon to remove the grievance in the judgment referred to, and in the further event of the Legislature declining so to do, a case will have arisen where "the Parliament of Canada is authorized to legislate on the same subject."

4. That this House is always prepared to abide by the constitution, which is the safeguard of our provincial rights, and will not be a party to its violation, nor will it seek to impair the efficiency of its provisions for protecting the rights and privileges of Her Majesty's subjects. At the same time, the House would deplore the occurrence of anything calling for the exercise by the Parliament of Canada of its authority to legislate on the subject of education, the ultimate effect of which it is impossible to foresee.

5. Having regard to the suggestions of the tribunal referred to that "all legitimate ground of complaint would be removed if the present system were supplemented by the provisions which would remove the grievance upon which the appeal is founded, and were modified so far as might be necessary to give effect to these provisions, without a repeal of the present law, this House is ready to consider the grievances referred to, with a view to providing reasonable relief, while maintaining, as far as possible consistent with that object, the principles of the present Act in their general application."

These resolutions are valuable as showing how the matter is viewed by many prominent men in the Province of Manitoba.
