FORUM IN THE FORUM

In calling the Potato Meeting of September 29th, the Federation was inspired by the very reasonable motive of bringing to those interested, information on both sides of a very controversial question.

In a democratic society, people are continually faced with the necessity of making decisions. In order that a reasoned conclusion may be arrived at, it is necessary that information be given and weighed on its merits. When, at any time, action is taken to suppress information, then the foundation and structure of democracy is in peril.

It was obvious that in this meeting, certain elements had decided that the free giving of information was not to be permitted. The tactics helped to produce the desired reaction, but undoubtedly also produced a marked lowering of prestige for the victors.

The Federation, seeking to act in an impartial way, gave equal privileges to both supporters and opponents. The general public was welcome at the meeting, welcome as spectators, but in many cases behaved in a manner ill befitting guests. Federation policy has been to hold meetings which are generally open to the public and provide an opportunity for free expression of opinion; it would indeed be unfortunate, if as a result of past experience, this policy had to be abandoned.

Viewed from any angle the meeting was a sorry demonstration — not from the standpoint of the decision — but as a demonstration of democracy in action.

Freedom And Compulsion

There has probably been more writing and talking in the democratic world on the subject of freedom than upon any other topic. Most thinking people realize that individual freedom only exists to an extent permitted by what is considered to be in the general interests of society. Possibly Adam was the only truly free man that ever lived and he lost a portion of his freedom with the advent of Eve.

MORE

As society developed and government became necessary the in-

dividual was compelled to conduct himself in a manner decided by his fellows within reasonable bounds. Many persons confuse freedom with licence. No individual has the right to expect, or may, behave in a manner inimical to society; society protects itself.

The present controversy in the potato question centres around the word "compulsion" a term which admittedly finds little favour with anyone. Democracy is based on the right of the majority to decide, that decision must always be accepted or anarchy rapidly follows.

BOUNTIES

The recent announcement that bounties are now payable on skunks, foxes and raccoon, will be read with satisfaction, particularly by those who are suffering from the depredations of the latter animal. One farmer suggested to us that there should be a much higher bounty on raccoons than on foxes. His argument ran as follows: Foxes do steal the occasional hen or chicken, but are easily kept out of poultry houses and don't damage crops in any way. The raccoon on the other hand is very determined in breaking his way into the poultry house and once inside kills for pleasure. In addition these animals do a great amount of damage to grain crops and can ruin corn, and in particular have a strong liking for sweet corn.

Only those who have seen it can credit the damage that the coon does in a corn field; stalks are pulled down and ears ripped open in almost unbelievable numbers. In portions of Kings County the raccoon has earned himself the reputation of the most destructive wild animal afoot.

long soft body made up of 13 sections, each section like an inflated automobile tire. Inside he is all stomach except for the three small sections right behind the head. Each of these sections behind the dome has a pair of real legs which correspond to the three pairs of legs on a butterfly. Perhaps the most amazing thing about a caterpillar is that one can't tell the head from the tail.

One of the oddest facts about the shark is that while it often attacks white people, it hardly ever bothers a colored person.

Fishermen who lived in Biblical days must often have harpooned the shark for in the Old Testament Job tells of harpooning a sea creature in these words: "Canst thou fill his skin with barbed irons, or his head with fish-spears?"

There are about 670,000 species of insects, 250,000 species of fishes, and 4,000 species of mammals.

Among mammals, only the echidna and the duck-billed platypus lay eggs.

Hardly a year passes that some prophet does not sit back and await the world's end. The latest to come to my attention is 77-year-old W. A. Nicholson, of Alca, Tennessee.

Nicholson expects that dreadful event to take place early in 1959, so, in order to be prepared for it, he has made himself a sturdy home. But why should he need a home if the world crumbles?
