TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Proclaiming a Meeting. ENNIS, Ireland, Sept. 2.

The Viceroy's proclamation forbidding the proposed meeting here was posted throughout the town. There was great excitement. Messrs. P. Stanhope, Dillon, O'Brien, Tanquer and Cox, all members of Parliament, have telegraphed to the local League officers, promising to attend the proposed meeting. The Nationalists have issued a manifesto, calling upon the men of "Historic Hill" to assemble in thousands on Gibraltar, "to fight the battle of the Constitution, which will be certain of a glorious consummation and disentanglement of Ireland."

Changed Hands. NEW YORK, Sept. 2.

It is announced to-night that the Baltimore & Ohio Railway has passed into the control of a syndicate of New York, Philadelphia and London bankers, and will hereafter be operated in harmony with other trunk lines. The B. & O. Telegraph Co. will be controlled by the Western Union, the B. & O. sleeping cars, by the Pullman Palace Car Co., and the B. & O. Express Co. by the United States Express Co.

An Attempted Escape. DORCHESTER, Sept. 2.

Two convicts—Dixon and McQueen—attempted to escape from the Penitentiary to-day. After scaling the wall, by means of two planks, they were seen by the guards in the watch-house, who fired on them, wounding Dixon in three places. When McQueen saw this he stopped. The doctor considers the wounds are not fatal.

The Canadian Wimbledon. OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

The Dominion Rifle Association meeting closed to-day, and the prizes were presented by Sir A. E. Caron, who complimented the riflemen on their success. Sir John Macdonald also made a brief speech.

Election Writs Issued. OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

The Speaker has issued warrants for writs for the elections in Dorchester and Yarmouth. Voting takes place in a few weeks, but the date is not yet fixed.

QUITE an ancient marriage took place at Amherst on Tuesday. M. J. Brownell, a groom of 82 winters, was married to Miss Wells, an amiable bride of 55 summers, by the Rev. G. F. Miles. Both were residents of Northport, Cumberland County.

THE St. John Telegraph says that some elegant and handsome dresses were worn by even more handsome ladies at the Wanderers' "at home." There were about one hundred and sixty present, many being strangers from Baltimore and other Southern cities, and some from the Island.

Canadian News.

Typhoid fever is on the increase in Montreal. There are at present 70 cases at the General Hospital.

Mrs. Dr. Keith, of Canterbury Station, York Co., has made a handsome silk crazy quilt, in which there are 3,500 pieces.

A Hindoo eye doctor, who has been practising in Winnipeg, has been fined at the instance of city physicians for not being qualified.

The Canadian Pacific railway statement of earnings and expenses for the seven months ending July 31st, shows a net profit of \$1,332,524 during that period.

The lobster fishery about Carriquet this season has been poor, the fish being small. The catch of herring, however, has been enormous, and 4,000 barrels of these fish are said to have been used for manure in the parish of Carriquet.

Mr. Isaac Pittman, the inventor of photography, has written Mr. Roy, of the Marine Department, Ottawa, granting permission to adopt his system for use in the French language. Mr. Roy will be obliged to pay a royalty on the books published.

Acadia Mines, Londonderry, N. S., boasts of having five churches, four temperance societies, one Free Masons Lodge, one Oddfellows lodge, one Orange lodge, one Foresters lodge, five school teachers, and not less than ten rum shops.

Mayor Howland, of Toronto, now that he has got the industrial school fairly started, is turning his attention to reclaiming drunkards. He has a scheme for the erection of an inebriate asylum, and at the next meeting of the City Council intends asking that body to pass a resolution appropriating a sum of money towards that object.

T. G. Marquis, who has been spending a part of his vacation with his family in Chatham, left Tuesday night for Queen's University, Kingston. On Monday morning he bravely jumped off Muirhead's wharf to the rescue of J. L. Stewart, of the World, who had fallen overboard from a boat and was in danger of drowning.

A Dalhousie correspondent sends the Moncton Times the following: We regret to announce the death of the Hon. Wm. Hamilton, which occurred yesterday morning at his late residence, Dalhousie, N. B. Mr. Hamilton was 76 years of age, and by far the senior member of the Legislative Council. Below will be found a sketch of his life, taken from the Canadian Parliamentary Companion: He descended from one of the Hamiltons, a native of King's Cross, Island of Arran, Scotland, who was the first settler and the first merchant in Dalhousie, N. B., that town having been first named "New Hamilton" after him. Born at King's Cross, Arran, in 1811, came to Canada in 1824, married in 1839, Jane, eldest daughter of Joseph McEwan, Esq., of P. E. Island. She died in 1880. Is a retired merchant. Has been Judge of the Inferior Court Common Pleas, and Warden of the County of Restigouche. Called to the L. C. in 1853. A Conservative. A Dalhousie despatch to the Globe says: Hon. William Hamilton, M. L. C., of Dalhousie, who has been a sufferer from Bright's disease for two years past, died this morning, Dr. Bayard, of St. John, has been in attendance. The more immediate cause of his death was congestion of the lungs. Mr. Hamilton having taken cold on a recent trip to Gaspé. The deceased was one of the most wealthy men in Restigouche. He leaves three sons, John, William and Alexander, and one daughter, Grace. The sons are in Liverpool, Glasgow and San Francisco respectively, and the daughter is here.
