Summer Communication.

This will never do! While the steamer plying between Summerside and Shediac is every day loaded down to the gunwale with freight, and the air of the gangways and saloons stinks of the excrement of horses, cattle, sheep and pigs...

This is not comfortable accommodation. This is not "continuous communication." This, if persisted in, will spoil the pleasure of summer tourists and destroy the summer traffic in passengers.

The idea of passengers having to lounge about Point du Chene and Pictou for hours waiting for steamer and train is utterly repugnant to the spirit of the age.

Go-ahead Yankees and live Canadians won't do it; and so they won't come here—or only in very much reduced numbers.

Then consider the inconvenience to our men of business. The mails arrive after midnight; the letters can't be touched till next morning; consequently they can't be answered by the mail of that day; and so the merchant has to wait until the day following; and is compelled to telegraph at exorbitant rates or suffer losses amounting to perhaps hundreds of dollars.

We won't speak of the smells. The subject is too disagreeable.

Now, we shall not blame the Steam Navigation Company. Indeed, we are glad that the freight offers, for it brings not only profit to the Company but prosperity to the country; and it should certainly be carried. Nor, shall we just yet blame the Government; for they are not, perhaps, fully cognizant of "the situation."

But if better accommodation is not soon provided great blame will be at the doors of both. The Continental mails should reach Charlottetown not later than seven o'clock every evening—they might be in by six or a quarter past six—and thus the traders of the Province would be enabled to correspond promptly with their fellows in the distant Provinces and the United States, while the unspeakable delays would be avoided.

An additional steamer is wanted. The subsidy should be increased to enable the Company to put on a boat specially for the carriage of mails and passengers and such light freight that may not emit noxious odors.

On behalf of the public we call the attention of the Company, our Representatives at Ottawa, and the Government to this important matter, in the hope that the change suggested will, as soon as possible, be effected.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Mail reports as follows regarding the proceedings in the Supreme Court:—

McKenzie vs. Corbet was a dispute respecting insurance of a vessel. In the application for the policy it was stated that the schooner was intended for coasting purposes, principally in Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

Morris et al. vs. Liquidators of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an appeal from the decision of Justice Peters ordering the shareholders to pay a call of eighty per cent. per share, who dispute their liability for more than 64 per cent., being twice the amount of their original stock.
