

Joe Brown Is Favored To Retain His Title Tonight

 CHICAGO (AP) — Heavily favored Joe Brown of New Orleans defends his world lightweight title at Chicago 8 (a d i u m tonight against Joey Lopez of Sacramento, Calif., who embarrassed him with a draw last summer.

The televised 15 - rounder will mark the third title defense by the 31-year-old Brown.

Lopez, 27, is ranked well down the list of lightweight contenders but ostensibly earned the title shot by holding Brown to a 10-round draw, in an overwrought match at Chicago Stadium Aug. 21.

With an expected crowd of about 5,000, the TV rerun will be larger than the gross gate, estimated at about \$20,000. The TV fee will be \$24,000 for Brown and \$2,000 for Lopez.

The two fighters will share the net gate, about \$17,000, on a 40-20 basis. Brown figuring to get \$6,800 and Lopez \$3,400. Thus Brown's total purse will be about \$18,000 and Lopez \$1,400, the biggest take of his career.

Brown is a 3-1 choice over Lopez, whose role as a championship opponent brought a big squawk from No. 1 contender Kenny Lane, long claiming for a crack at Brown's title. The odds are 2-1 Brown will knock out Lopez.

Little guy, scoring 28 knockouts in 16 fights, won his 135-pound crown from Wallace 'Bud' Smith in New Orleans with a 15 - round decision Aug. 24, 1956.
