Question Of Who Leaked Norman Report Mystery

OTTAWA (CP)—Who leaked the RCMP report on Herbert Norman to the United States Senate internal security sub-committee?
That remains one of the biggest unanswered questions in the wave of official statements which followed the April 4 suicide in Cairo of Mr. Norman, Canadian ambassador to Egypt.
Some officials here say they believe the origin of the leak can be traced to Tokyo where Mr. Norman served before and during the early months of the Korean War.
In common with some other Canadian officials, Mr. Norman was critical of the way Gen. Douglas MacArthur conducted the United Nations effort. MacArthur was warned that the Chinese Communists would invade Korea if the UN carried the war to the Chinese border. He pressed on regardless and the UN was driven back by the Chinese.
HAD IT IN FOR HIM
The Americans surrounding Gen. MacArthur were extremely loyal to their chief and, it is reported here, resented Mr. Norman's criticisms. As one informant said here, some of them had it in for Norman.

In any case, the U.S. Intelligence Corps apparently asked the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation to obtain what information it could on Mr. Norman.
The FBI passed on the request to the RCMP. The latter, hunting through its files, came up with a 1940 report from one of its secret agents that was a member of the Communist party of Canada.
This report was forwarded to the FBI Oct. 17, 1950, which sent it on to the U.S. Army Intelligence Corps Nov. 1, 1950, two weeks later.
There would appear little reason for this information to have been passed on to the U.S. army unless it had asked for it in the first place.
ALL DENY LEAK
The intelligence corps, the FBI and the U.S. state department have all denied that they turned over the information to the sub-committee.
But speculation here is that the information was seen by one or more of MacArthur's former aides who passed it on to the sub-committee.
Also unanswered is what happened to the RCMP report to the FBI Dec. 1, 1950, which said the

information supplied by the secret agent in 1940 was a case of "mistaken identity or unfounded rumor."
It would appear likely that the FBI passed this second report to the U.S. Army Intelligence Corps inasmuch as the first had gone to it.
ONLY ONE MADE PUBLIC
In any event, the first report—but not the second—was made public by the sub-committee last March 12, more than six years after it was supplied by the RCMP to the FBI. It is not known when the sub-committee got possession of it.
External Affairs Minister Pearson has said that Mr. Norman, 47 at his death, had held, as a student in the 1930s, "ideological beliefs which were close to some brand of communism."
But, he has said, he had concluded from a 1950-51 security investigation of Mr. Norman that the late ambassador "regretted these earlier associations and beliefs and had voluntarily abandoned them" by the time he joined the external affairs department in 1939.

Gets Picture Of Fatal Accident

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—A steel construction worker stood on a tower, 175 feet high, guiding a church steeple into place as it was hoisted by cables fastened to a boom.
J. B. Stanridge, 38, glanced a photographer as he reached for the steel framework, hauling the steeple toward the base.
Ed Jones, photographer for the Birmingham News, had been sent to make feature pictures of the operation.
As Stanridge clasped the steeple, Jones clicked his camera, switched plates by habit, and started to call it a day.
"One more," he thought, just to be sure.
Jones lined up the tower in his camera. There was the sound of splintering steel: a gasp from the group of workmen at the base of the tower.
The "gin" pole supporting the steeple snapped; there was a tearing of cables. The steeple toppled slowly outward, dragging Stanridge with it.
Jones followed the falling steeple with his camera. His dramatic picture showed Stanridge riding the steeple to his death, 175 feet below.
Stanridge, of Bangor, Ala., was one of three workmen at the top of the tower. The others were unhurt.
