

Lindsay Scores 200th Goal; Beliveau Finishes Stint With Canadiens

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—Ted Lindsay tonight became the first player in Detroit history to score 200 goals in National Hockey League competition as the rapping Red Wings trounced the tail-end New York Rangers 5-2.

Sharing the limelight with Lindsay were Metro Prystai, who netted his 100th goal, and defenceman Marcel Pronovost, who chipped in with a pair of goals and two assists.

The triumph enabled the Wings to extend their unbeaten streak to 12 games and protect their four-point lead over the second-place Montreal Canadiens.

BOSTON, Dec. 21 (CP)—Big Jean Beliveau finished his three-game stand with Montreal tonight by scoring two goals as the Canadiens defeated Boston's Bruins 4-3 to take undisputed possession of second place in the National Hockey League.

The biggest Boston Garden crowd of the season, 12,984, turned out to watch the talented 21-year-old star up from Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior Hockey League.

Beliveau proved just as good as his advance notices as he fired two second period goals that sent Canadiens into a 3-2 lead. But Real Chevrefils was credited with the equalizer in that middle session as Woody Dumart's long blazer bounced off his skate past Montreal goaler Gerry McNeil.

It took a third period goal at 7:36 by veteran Kenny Mosdell to clinch the victory for Canadiens.

"Now did you see where Arlie Latham died at 93?" he asked the writer.

"I can't beat anyone any more in baseball, I'm finished. But I want to live longer than Arlie did. They say he set a record for baseball people by living that long. I'd like to beat him."

Mack will celebrate his 90th anniversary on Tuesday.

Arlie Latham was the oldest living major leaguer at his death several weeks ago. He played for St. Louis Browns from 1886 through 1889.

Sharp shooting "Buck" Whitlock of the Islanders suffered considerable loss from a fire early Saturday morning and only for his 13-year-old son Bobby likely would have been the victim of much more serious results. A fire broke out in Buck's home on the Malpeque Road around six o'clock and smoke from the blaze had pretty well filled the upstairs of the house before Bobby woke his father to inquire about the strange haze.

It's a fortunate thing that Bobby was inquisitive enough to ask about the smoke. As it was, the fire which broke out in the clothes closet, destroyed practically all of "Buck's" and his wife's clothes. On awakening Buck immediately called the Fire Department and the blaze was extinguished without much further damage. As a result of the fire Buck did not make the trip to Glace Bay with the Islanders on Saturday night but will be back in the lineup tonight.

It has become a well-proven fact that in hockey or in baseball the players you trade or sell usually always come back to give you the most trouble. Leo Lamoureux experienced such a case last year when he dealt Johnny Morrow to Halifax Saint Mary's. Morrow, although no ball of fire in the regular league, turned out to be a tough customer in the play-offs and produced some of his best hockey against the Islanders. This year, the two players, who may give the Islanders some of their most trying moments, could be Jim MacKenzie and Connie Bonhomme.

Neither wanted to go to Glace Bay last week but before they went Bonhomme vowed that he would make Chamberlain sorry he ever made the deal. Connie started off with a bang Saturday night by scoring the winning goal in the Islanders 4-2 win over the Islanders with Hub Macey to centre them. Both Bonhomme and MacKenzie should be good for quite a few goals and they should add some spark to what has been a drab Glace Bay offensive effort this year. Their performance tonight will be watched with interest.

Murph Chamberlain, with a telegram in his pocket to the effect that Wimpy Stephenson and Orville Kelly have been recalled to Buffalo, is not too disturbed over the cries from some quarters that the Islanders have exceeded the player limit of 25 men. "Stephenson and Kelly have been recalled and we are entitled to two more player cards. That's all there is to it," stated the Hardrock.

Chamberlain does not intend to stand pat with his present line-up either. He is looking for a centre man or any other good player whom he figures can help the club. "Any time we can get a good player," he'll bring him in," stated Chamberlain. "As for Halifax I don't know what they're yapping about. They have been winning all along. The only thing I can see is that they figured at the start of the season they would walk away with the League. It's still a long winter ahead."

It's a safe bet that the next time the Islanders meet Halifax the players won't break training rules before the game. Four players, who broke training have been threatened with \$100 fines by Chamberlain. The Hardrock, who has a burning desire to win every game the club plays and who was especially anxious to win last Friday night's game does not take such serious offenses lightly.

GAYE STEWART SENT TO QUEBEC ACES BY CANADIENS

MONTREAL, Dec. 21 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens announced Saturday that Gaye Stewart, acquired by waiver 10 days ago from New York Rangers, has been sent to Quebec Aces of the Quebec Senior Hockey League on loan.

The loan is for the remainder of the season but Stewart will be subject to immediate recall.

Connie Bonhomme and Jim MacKenzie return to Charlottetown tonight wearing the uniform of the invader as the Glace Bay Miners take on the Islanders in a Maritime Major Hockey League game at the Forum.

Bonhomme, who will likely be paying on a line with coach Hub Macey, has already started out well on his boast that he would make the Islanders sorry they traded him. Saturday night at the Bay he shot what turned out to be the winning goal against the Islanders and tonight both he and MacKenzie will likely be going all out in an attempt to repeat the trick.

But tonight the boys will have big Gus Gustavson to contend with. "The Big Swede" has served his six game suspension sentence and from here on Bonhomme will be suspended at the same time as Gustavson, will also be back in action.

The Islanders will be at full strength for the first time in several weeks. All players except Bill Hagan who has just been released from hospital, will see action against the Miners.

The game will start at nine o'clock, one half-hour later than the usual starting time. The time was set back in order to allow Christmas shoppers and clerks to make the game.

The Miners and Islanders are separated by six points in the league standings. A win for the Islanders moves them into a tie with Sydney Millionaires for second place but a loss leaves them dangerously close to the basement.

Big Row Over Reversed N. Y. Fight Decision

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—Middleweight Joe Giardello of Philadelphia and his managers cooled off during the week-end in their demands for a legal test of the rights of the New York State Athletic Commission to reverse a decision of its own officials.

But the heat still is on Robert K. Christenberry, chairman of the commission. Christenberry is faced by at least one demand that he resign, considerable sharp criticism from New York state sports writers and the wrath of betters.

It all stemmed from the action Friday night in changing the card of judge Joe Agnello and thus giving Billy Graham of New York the decision over Giardello in the televised 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden. It was first announced that Giardello was the winner.

Immediately after the bout, Anthony Ferrante, one of Giardello's co-managers angrily said he would institute court proceedings to test the commission's right to reverse a decision. Today, after the boxer told them he'd rather fight Graham again than in the courts, managers agreed they would "fight it to the hilt for the good of boxing," but the "fight" would consist only of asking the commission for a hearing.

Christenberry said the hearing would be granted "if they present something to justify it," but otherwise it was finished business.

The demand for Christenberry's resignation came from Frank Hyde, sports editor of the James-town, N. Y., Post-Journal. Hyde wrote:

"Christenberry told the press that if he cannot call them as he sees them, he will resign. We respectfully submit that in the best interest of boxing in our state, he do just that. He came to our town last winter and said: 'I don't know a blessed thing about boxing. If you were to hand me a scorecard right now, I wouldn't know how to score a fight.' That didn't keep Rapid Robert from reaching over virtually taking a card out of the hands of a man who has been scoring for decades and changing the decision to his own taste."

Quebecers Wager Heavily On Races

QUEBEC, Dec. 21 (CP)—Quebecers bet \$16,300,000 on flat and sulky racing this year through pari-mutuel, it was learned today.

While exact figures could not be obtained, the round figure was a record and compared with \$10,000,000 in 1951.

The figure included approximately \$3,300,000 wagered on flat racing at Montreal's Blue Bonnets, the only such track in the province.

Quebec Exhibition Park led all sulky racing clubs with a total of \$5,400,000 wagered during the racing days. Richelieu Park of Montreal came second with \$4,500,000 and Three Rivers third with \$1,500,000.

The next three were: Connaught Park, Hull, with \$617,000; Jonquiere with \$376,000 and Drummondville with \$160,000. All are rough figures.

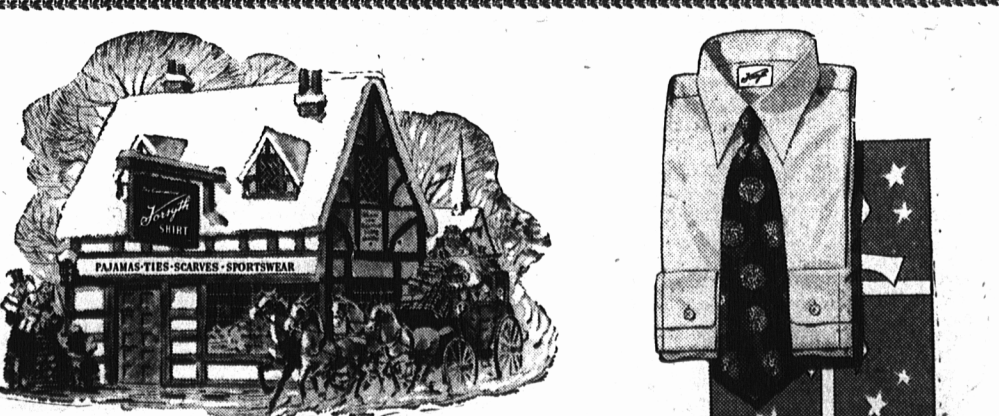
Sulky races were held in 10 other centres with betting totals less than \$50,000. They were: Rimouski, Berthierville, St. Georges de Beauce, Gatineau, Sherbrooke, St. Jerome, Dolbeau, Scorer, Theford Mines and Malartic.

Over-all attendance was 916,000, up from 739,000 last year.
