New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)-The stock market last week maintained a record-breaking pace that shoved it toward the fateful all-time peak of 1929. For the last 14 months the market has been climbing at a dizzy pace seldom interrupted by a reaction. In mid-year it got up to the old levels of 1929, the October days when the stock market was in convulsions that only ended with the deep depression in 1932. Last week it was poised around the highest point in 25 years when it recessed for election day. The election results touched off a headlong rise that hasn't been matched since the troubled days before the start of the Second World War. Brokers feel the election is not the sole cause for the current surge although Wall street on the morning after the election concluded that the Republicans had done much better than expected. That triggered buying in a big wave. Every day last week the market established 25-year high marks with the Associated Press average ending the week at \$143.50, high-

French, British Socialists Okay Paris Pact

PARIS (Reuters)-French Socialists overwhelmingly decided to support ratification of the German rearmament treaties Thursday as a necessary preliminary to fresh East-West negotiations. The Socialist decision at a special national party congress virtually assured French ratification of the Paris treaties before the end of the year. The main block to ratification now lies in Bonn where Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has encountered heavy opposition to his agreement with Premier Pierre Mendès-France on internationalizing the Saar. However, Adenauer Thursday predicted West German ratification by mid-January. The French Socialist congress voted 2,817 to 454 with 93 abstentions in favor of the agreements signed in Paris last month to grant West Germany sovereignty, a 500,000-man army and membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. This means most if not all of the 104 Socialist deputies in the assembly will vote for ratification.

New England Apple And Potato Crops

BOSTON (AP)-The New England crop reporting service said today the apple and potato crops this year were below those of 1953. The New England apple crop in commercial counties was 6,275,000 bushels, about one-fifth less than last year but about the same as the 10-year average. Potato production is estimated at 57,654,000 bushels as of Nov. 1, which was 12 per cent less than the 1953 crop and 21 per cent less than the 10-year average.

N. B. Lobster Catch Totals 3,830,700 Lbs

MONCTON (CP)-A total of 3,830,700 pounds of lobsters was reported from traps and landed at various eastern New Brunswick ports where fishermen were paid \$1,262,661. While the landed catch weight was nearly 300,000 pounds lighter, fishermen were nearly \$20,000 richer at the end of the 1954 season. A.A. Robichaud, Moncton, district fisheries protection officer for Westmorland and Albert Counties, also announced that the season had been marked by increased co-operation by fishermen in curbing illegal fishing practices. In 1953 the total landed catch for three counties was 4,125,800 pounds with a landed value of \$1,240,673.

Mr. Robichaud said it was believed the decrease in the landed catch was due to a scarcity of lobster. The increase in value was due to higher prices which held firmer throughout this season than last, he added. For 1954, 1,800 fishermen in the three counties shared in the bonanza. NEW GLASGOW (CP)-The I. B. Matheson Company said during the weekend it will rebuild the plant here destroyed in a \$300,000 fire Friday night. The 100-year-old machine company was wiped out as flames whipped through seven buildings. Firemen fought the blaze for five hours before bringing it under control.

War On Mice

VICTORIA (CP) Foresters in a Douglas fir area near here battled a big invasion of mice by dropping poisoned wheat from helicopters. Mice died by the thousands after eating the wheat in mistake for fir seeds, and a carpet of young trees now covers the area.

VICTORIA (CP) - Victoria publicity officials who have been annoyed by scattered references to Vancouver as the capital of British Columbia, were really inked when they came across a letter from a Toronto manufacturing firm, addressed to "President, village board, Victoria."

Fine Catch

VERNON, B.C. (CP) - An eight-pound trout only two years old was caught near here by J.B. McCallum. Experts said it is one of the largest two-year-old trout on record.

Cold Over There

WADENA, Sask. (CP) - David Russell, captain of a hockey team in Scotland, said in a letter home that Canadian players overseas have learned to appreciate Canadian-style home heating. Players in Scotland wear hockey toques and socks in bed in an effort to keep warm.

Pope Discusses Priests Rights

VATICAN CITY (Reuters)-The Pope, in a speech released yesterday, asserted the right of the Roman Catholic priesthood to pronounce on social and political problems, which "undoubtedly come within the moral sphere." W. a. r. conscientious objection, totalitarianism, secular schools and the secular state are such issues, he told an assembly of cardinals and bishops Tuesday. The Pontiff said "we must take an open and firm stand against the error of trying to restrain the church from all undertakings and business which concern life as it is really conducted."

Discuss War, Reds

Among the problems on which the church and clergy had the right to speak with authority for all Roman Catholics were: 1. The morality of war "waged as it is today and whether a conscientious person may give or withhold his co-operation in it." 2. "The moral relationships which bind and rule the nations." 3. "The so-called totalitarian state, on whatever principle it is based." 4. Complete secularization of the state and public life and of schools. 5. Relations between the individual and society. 6. "The purpose and limits of temporal authority."

Attlee Triumphs

In London, full bipartisan support for the British government's policies on West German rearmament was assured when Labor party leader Clement Attlee gained an almost two-to-one vote from Labor members of Parliament in favor of ratifying the Paris treaties. It was a major triumph for Attlee. The vote put an end to a bitter dispute within the Labor party and constituted a strong rebuff to Aneurin Bevan and his left-wingers. The Labor MPs voted 124 to 72, with about 100 Labor members of Parliament abstaining in favor of the Paris agreements. Under these accords a rearmend West Germany will be brought into the Western European Union and the Atlantic pact. Woman Denies Murder Attempt

HULL, Que. (CP)-Mrs. Therese Chalut, 35-year-old widow charged with attempted murder Thursday swore "on the head of my dead father" that she never threatened to kill Leo Regimbald after a quarrel at a party last Jan. 9. The woman made the statement in Superior Court when questioned about statements in which she was alleged to have threatened Regimbald's life. The only defence witness, she testified through several outbursts of tears that she married at the age of 13, lost her husband and had lived with Regimbald for several months before his jaw and mouth were partly shot off by a rifle shot.

Poland Settles Debt With U. K.

LONDON (AP) - Communist Poland agreed to pay \$5,465,000 to Britain Thursday in settlement of pre-war debts and as compensation for British property seized in the country. The treasury said the agreement was reached in London after six months of negotiations. At the same time, a British mission in Warsaw signed a trade pact for 1954-56 calling for the exchange of non-strategic manufactured goods for Polish food and raw materials.

Recall Ambassador

CAIRO (Reuters)-Egypt has recalled her ambassador at Damascus, Maj. Gen. Aly Naguib, because "Syria has done nothing to curb the activities there of the Moslem Brotherhood," a government spokesman said here Saturday. The spokesman said Egypt had taken this action after repeated requests to Syria to stop anti-Egyptian demonstrations staged by the brethren in Damascus.
