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## Fast-West Test Believe Reached Reaches Further Parley Is Sated Today

OTTAWA (CP) — Ever since last February's cabinet revolt against Prime Minister Diefenbaker, dark mutterings have recurred among Conservatives that George Hees, one of their star performers as trade minister, was being groomed for the Liberal party.

MOSCOW (AP) — Smiling Friday Tuesday, apparently having drawn up a partial nuclear test-ban treaty satisfactory to all sides. But they scheduled another meeting for today, possibly to talk about an East-West non-aggression pact.

If the British and Americans have their way, the new talks will begin in Geneva, in the committee on disarmament which has been struggling in vain for two years to get something done.

Twice there seemed, on the surface, to be something to the story although close friends of the 53-year-old business executive and ex-MP discounted it at the time.

An hour before the chief delegates emerged from Spiridonovka Palace, their experts met to discuss the draft of a treaty which would ban nuclear tests in the air, space and under water.

Khrushchev has demanded especially a non-aggression pact between the 15 NATO nations of the west and the seven Communist nations of the Warsaw pact.

Hees, who made politics his life's work from the time he entered Parliament in 1950 until he voluntarily withdrew last February, was an opposition MP until the Conservatives came to power in 1962.

It was learned that the proposed treaty was modelled after one Britain and the United States submitted to the 17-nation disarmament conference in Geneva last Aug. 27. The Russians rejected it.

Khrushchev also asked for a standstill agreement on nuclear spending. After signing here, the nuclear treaty would have to be approved by each government.
