### Dominican Conflict Flares Anew

SANTO DOMINGO (AP) — The Dominican conflict flared up again Thursday with raids by Dominican planes and a skirmish that killed two American soldiers.

At least one person, a five-year-old child, was killed in what rebel authorities said was a bombing-rafting run against the rebel radio by U.S.-made aircraft of the military-civilian junta.

One American soldier was killed outright and another died of wounds on the operating table after a three-man U.S. patrol was hit by rebel fire after it apparently strayed deep into rebel territory.

A U.S. spokesman also reported the death of a marine by sniper fire Wednesday night. The radio station manager told reporters the station was strafed. But a rebel lieutenant said two U.S.-made P-51 Mustangs and four AT-6s trainers equipped with bombs struck the station's transmitting tower.

## Prince County Projects Inspected By Premier

SUMMERSIDE — An inspection of Prince County winter works projects by Premier Walter Shaw included a stop in Summerside yesterday.

During his inspection of the senior citizen's home and home for the aged, the premier erected a provincial sign.

Similar signs will be placed on all public buildings on Granville Street, including the Vocational and Athena high schools, the proposed Rogers Ranch and the Health Centre.

While in town the Premier also visited Rogers ranch, and the Raceway. In the afternoon he inspected senior citizens homes in Miscouche, Wellington, O'Leary and Alberton. Also included in the western tour were stops at provincial parks in West Prince and the proposed national park at West Prince.

In Tignish, Mr. Shaw viewed the new community rink and sports complex.

Notable dignitaries accompanying the premier were: the minister of health, Dr. Hubert MacNeill, and Hon. Henry Wedge, minister of welfare and labor.

## West Germany, Israel Establish Relations

BONN (Reuters)—West Germany and Israel have established diplomatic relations, 20 years after the fall of Nazi Germany.

A West German government spokesman said an exchange of letters began the establishment of relations. Ambassadors will be exchanged soon.

Felix Shinnar, head of the Israeli restitution mission in Cologne, brought a letter from Israeli Premier Eshkol. In exchange, he received one from Chancellor Erhard.

(Earlier, Iraq severed relations with West Germany over the Bonn move to establish relations with Israel.)

The exchange came almost 16 weeks after Erhard's March 7 decision to seek diplomatic relations with Israel—a decision made paradoxically under successful Arab pressure on Bonn to end secret arms aid to Israel.

Bonn's move was a reaction to the visit to Cairo in February of East German Leader Walter Ulbricht. The Communist leader was given a state welcome which Bonn saw as tantamount to recognition.

## Local Sheep Breeders Elect Southport Man

Athol Roberts, Southport, was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Sheep Breeders Association at the annual meeting held last night at Birch Court on the Experimental Farm.

Russell Buell, Abney, is vice-president. S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The industry is declining here in the province it was revealed. The marketings of 1964 amounting to slightly more than 8,220 animals is down 5,000 from that of 1959, it was revealed.

The 17,000 sheep and lambs in the province in June 1964 represented a drop of 1,000 animals from the previous year, Mr. Wright reported.

Livestock Officer H. C. Heertz, Canada Department of Agriculture, said the quality has dropped as well as the quantity. The 56 percent of good and choice lambs last year compares with 82 to 83 percent only a few years ago.

George Boswell, Frenchfort, is the choice to judge sheep at the provincial exhibition in August. John Thompson, Frenchfort, was named to represent the sheep breeders on the Federation of Agriculture board of directors.

Allison Stewart, Dunstaffnage, was named representative to the Royal Winter Fair.

Edwin Hansen, Tyne Valley, was named director for Prince County. He replaces Hudson Pridham, Montrose, who retired after more than 15 years service as a director, as he has disposed of his sheep.

Howard Norton, Annandale, is the new director for Kings County and Allison Stewart was named for Queens.

Retiring president J. Reid Underhay, Bay Fortune, presided.

## Need For Expansion At Dal. Said Outdating Current Plan

HALIFAX (CP) — The need for expansion at Dalhousie University has outdated a current \$16,000,000 campus development plan by about \$30,000,000, university president Dr. Henry D. Hicks said Thursday.

Dr. Hicks said in a convocation address that four new buildings were necessary if Dalhousie was to "play its role in educating the people of Nova Scotia."

The expansion plan presented by Dr. Hicks calls for a new library, an addition to the arts building, a new chemistry building and a new marine biology centre.

He said Dalhousie was expanding at a rate slightly higher than the national average.

Degrees in arts, science, commerce and engineering were presented to about 350 students, the largest graduating class in the history of the university. Also conferred were 52 master's degrees in arts and science, and five doctor of philosophy degrees.

Top student of the year was Karen J. Ridgeway of Halifax. She won the governor-general medal for highest average and the Sir William Young medal in mathematics.

Honorary doctorates of law were conferred upon Dr. Dixie Pelletier, former professor of biology at the university; Dr. F.R. Hayes, chairman of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada; and Dr. Donald Olding Hebb, a Dalhousie alumnus, who has made contributions to the field of experimental psychology.

## Plug Confederation Jaycees Are Told

SUMMERSIDE — The national president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, W. J. A. (Bill) Rowe, of Calgary, Alta., told the local Jaycees at a dinner meeting last night that they should "keep plugging confederation" and put forth a great effort for the 1967 centennial celebrations.

Speaking before a group which included Premier Walter R. Shaw, Mr. Rowe was of the opinion that there were too many across Canada who were downgrading the 1967 celebrations. He was opposed to these ideas and felt that the centennial two years from now should be given as much publicity as possible, adding that it was an "important year in the development of our country."

Among the guests at the dinner was Premier Shaw who was returning from a tour of Prince County. Premier Shaw also addressed the group briefly and told of visiting an area yesterday where a music festival was being held. It gave him a great feeling, he said to see these young folk singing songs, playing music and in general developing the cultural side of this province.

He added that his tour reminded him of a visit to the Scandinavian countries a few years ago where the natives of those countries not only assured themselves of the economic but also of the cultural developments.

He cautioned the Jaycees not to ever think that the earning of dollars and cents was the all-important thing in life and added that other outlets which appeal "to our senses", such as music, art and drama should be developed as well.

Following the dinner, Mr. Rowe presided at the swearing-in ceremonies of the recently-elected Summerside unit officers which included the taking oath of office by the incoming president Gardner MacNeill.

Mr. Rowe leaves here today for Moncton where he will attend the annual meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Junior Chamber of Commerce.

## Island Spuds At High Price

The Canada department of agriculture's daily market report dated May 11 states P.E.I. potatoes were selling for \$4.40 per 75-pound bag to Ottawa retailers this week.

The price range was \$4.20 to \$4.40 in Toronto. The 75s were listed at \$4.00 to \$4.25 and Montreal \$4.10 to \$4.25.

The P.E.I. 50s were bringing a premium of 20 cents in Montreal over N.B. spuds. Price for the Island ones ran \$2.85 to \$2.95. They were listed at \$2.85 to \$3.00 in Ottawa and \$2.75 to \$2.90 in Toronto.

A total of 10,382 carloads had been shipped out of the province in the current crop year, the report indicated, and this compares with 10,333 carloads at the same time a year ago.
