Nuclear Power Station Due On-Site At Trois-Rivieres

OTTAWA (CP)—Construction of a \$106,000,000 nuclear power station on the St. Lawrence River near Trois-Rivieres has been announced in the Commons by Mines Minister Pepin.
The 250,000-kilowatt plant will be built by Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd., the federal nuclear agency, under an agreement with Hydro-Quebec which will purchase the power production.
Mr. Pepin said the site is at Pointe aux Roches on the south shore between Beaucour and Gently 10 miles downstream from Trois-Rivieres. The plant will be known as the Gently power station.
Completion is scheduled for 1971. Hydro-Quebec will operate the station and will purchase it from Atomic Energy after it has demonstrated its reliability. Mr. Pepin said the purchase price, which he didn't reveal, would enable Hydro-Quebec to produce power at a cost equal to that of power produced by coal-burning thermal plants.
The arrangement is similar to that between Atomic Energy and the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission for two nuclear stations.
Opposition Leader Diefenbaker suggested Mr. Pepin was making the announcement now because a federal byelection campaign is going on in Nicolet-Yamaska, a seat held by the Conservatives until the resignation of Clement Vincent present Quebec minister of agriculture.
