THE PLEBISCITE.

A Temperance Man Voices the Indignation of the Temperance People.

In the course of his speech on the address Hon. Mr. Foster said:

The First Minister had touched upon the plebiscite. Characteristic again. To carry his own dealings on the plebiscite question he threw the blame on Sir Charles Tupper because he only dropped a tea into the bosom of the prohibitionists and did not say he would do anything more. If the hon. gentleman had dropped tears of repentance for his long course of action on this and other matters he would be nearer making his peace with the people above than he is at present. But, says the hon. gentleman, we have broken no pledge. The prohibitionists, he says, made no demand. That will be news to some of the gentlemen behind him, because his supporters who conducted the elections in 1896 and the campaign before went to the prohibitionists everywhere and said: "See what Laurier has promised you. The Tories never promised you anything like that. Vote for Laurier and the Liberals. They will give you what you want." The First Minister knows that he profited by them; yet the Premier has the assurance to say here that he made no pledge. It is a mere casuist's plea and nothing else.

The whole thing was simply a device to catch votes. It was silly to think that a great political party could meet in convention and make public declarations by which they pledged themselves to a certain line of action and then declared that those pledges were made only to the party. Such conduct showed a sublime disdain for the common intelligence of humanity.

Who was it that introduced that prohibition plank in the Liberal platform? It was the present Minister of Agriculture. There was no implication with regard to that resolution, nor was any mention made at the convention when it was adopted that this plebiscite plank was simply given on an implied condition that at least one half of the total vote should be in favour of it before it would be enacted into law.

At Stratford before an audience of 4800, on the 9th of June, Mr. Laurier, that was, is thus reported to have spoken. "Mr. Laurier's attention was given to prohibition. He said: "Up to this moment the question of prohibition has never been approached by electors free from other considerations. We deem it wiser to separate it from all considerations and to test the public feeling on the matter. We shall do so when we shall come into office, as I believe we shall. Then I am asked what is to be done? The answer is plain. I am by nature a democrat; I believe in democratic government and above all in a constitutional government and the only way to act under a democratic and constitutional government is that the people must govern and their command must be obeyed. As the people shall speak so shall the any of the government be in the hands of the Liberal party." This explanation of the Liberal policy on the prohibition question was apparently satisfactory from the applause with which it was received.

A CRUEL HOAX.

This plebiscite vote is 23 per cent., but oh the cruelty of it, and the unmanliness of it, and the lack of anything like public frankness of it, to bring the two sections of the people of this country together in a heated contest over a great principle and to keep secret from them the ultimatum which he knew would dash down irreparably every hope they had of carrying that which they believed to be good for this country. You may be an anti-prohibitionist and I may be a prohibitionist, and we both may be honest in our beliefs. Neither of us would impugn the honesty of the other; neither of us, if we had a spark of manliness within us would think it was proper or manly to gain the advantage by setting contestants to work under secret and implied conditions which utterly handicapped one of them, and gave the victory without a shadow of doubt to the other. Such is unfair in the rules of the ring; such is equally unfair and unmanly in public politics. But it is characteristic of the hon. gentleman and it is characteristic of his government. They seem to have lost any feeling of honest men, that they are bound by their privileges and bound to do what they said they will do, when they were seeking for power and place and for position. The churches, and the unions, and the earnest men and women of this country demand it, that this manly and frank treatment should have been given to them; they have not had it. My own opinion is that they will think about this matter, and think about it very seriously, and above all hold this on high: That the question at this present moment is not as to what should constitute a requisite majority, but the question is as to the policy and the course which led men and women on for years and then pitted them into a contest where one party was handicapped by a secret implication and a condition which effectually put them out of all possibility of success. (Cheers.)

Snow and Influenza.

BERLIN, March 22.—There has been a recurrence of snow storms accompanied by severe cold, throughout Germany, and a great amount of damage has been done to vegetation. The weather has aggravated the influenza epidemic. In Berlin alone yesterday morning only there were over two hundred deaths from influenza. The schools have been closed in East Prussia this week owing to the spreading of the disease.

POPE'S CRITICAL DATE.

A Prophecy Which Implies Ten Years More of Life.

ROME, March 22.—The Pope appears to have recovered from his serious indisposition which gave rise to the recent alarming reports. His Holiness has never had a strong constitution.

About his 20th year he believed that he was wasting with phthisis and wrote an elegant piece of Latin on his approaching end, "Why Platter Thyself?"

Ten years later, when he was apostolic delegate at Benevento, he came near dying of a pernicious fever. It was thought that he was lost. He was saved by an act, then thought foolhardy of Dr. Volpi, physician to the King of Naples, plunging him into a bath of cold water at the moment of the most violent attack of the fever.

Leo XIII. has not gone out of the vast enclosure which surrounds the Vatican in twenty years, and yet has surpassed the years of life of Pius the IX., who alone of all the popes had exceeded the years of Peter.

In the eyes of superstitious Romans Leo XIII. has performed another miracle of longevity. He has escaped a critical date, one determined by a cabalistic calculation which set the end of his life for the year 1892. It is said all his predecessors in this century—Pius IX., Gregory XVI., Pius VIII., Leo XII., Pius VII.—have obeyed the law of figures. Leo XIII., alone has escaped it, and the same calculation, if it were exact in his case, would assign him ten years more of existence, which would make the pontiff surpass even the age of Doge Dandolo.

HE'S A DESPERATE CHIEF

Aguinaldo Silencing Weak kneed Natives With Death

MANILA, March 22.—It is reported on good authority that Aguinaldo is taking extreme measures to suppress signification to cause a cessation of hostilities. Twelve deaths of the plan of insurrection, residents of Manila, have been condemned to death because they wrote advising surrender, and a loyal Filipino has been called upon to perform the national service of despatching them.

On Friday last General Legarda visited Malolos for the purpose of advising Aguinaldo to quit. He argued with the insurgent leader and attempted to convince him of the folly of his persistence in the face of overwhelming odds.

Aguinaldo was furious at the advice and ordered General Legarda to be executed immediately. The unfortunate general was promptly decapitated.

Among the incidents of Sunday's fighting was the capture exhibited by a company of the Washington volunteers who crossed the river in a native canoe under a heavy fire—fifteen being taken across on each trip of the small boat—to attack the enemy's trenches.

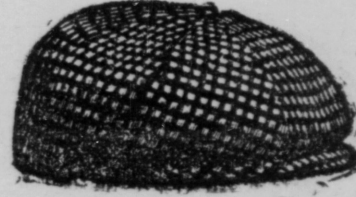
