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Leave Today For Convention At Paris, France

Mr. and Mrs. J. Frank Arnett leave today to attend the International Rotary convention in Paris, France, and they will be in London for the coronation. They will be joined in New York by Mrs. Arnett's sister, Mrs. E. C. Blundell of Hudson, Wisconsin.

They will sail from New York on the liner Italia on May 8 and plan to spend ten days in London before going to France. After the convention they will return to London just in time for the coronation and following this memorable occasion will spend some time visiting in England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

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S'ide Soldiers Describe Conditions In Korea

In an interview last night at the Canadian Legion Home in Summerside, three Summerside soldiers, Lance Corporal Basil Campbell, Pte. J. L. E. Gallant and Pte. C. J. Richards expressed great delight at being home again and described some of their experiences and impressions in Korea.

The three soldiers, all members of the First Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment and part of a group of 17 Islanders, are just back from a year's tour of duty in Korea that saw them in recent action on such well known fronts of battle as Hill 355 and The Hook. They described battle conditions in their area as very nerve wrecking. Quite often the only shelter from enemy fire is deep within the dug-out bunkers, some six feet underground, and these bunkers, in addition to providing shelter also provide sleeping quarters for the soldiers.

difference between shooting and being shot. They described the country as being very hilly and one soldier summed it up by saying "if it were twice as hilly it would be flat." They said that the civilian population lives quite close to the front and under severe and extremely poor conditions. The housing consists of holes in the ground except for the more fortunate who live in mud shacks.

The three soldiers described Canadian Army supplies as quite adequate and said the food was fair. They expressed great appreciation for parcels received from the Summerside Legion and Ladies Auxiliary.

These three Korean veterans and any others who have returned from Korea recently will be guests of honor this evening at a reception and dance held in the Canadian Legion Home when they will be officially welcomed home.

Gives Address On Highway Safety At Summerside

Mr. Watson Jamer, executive vice president of the New Brunswick Safety League and district manager of the Ford Motor Company in Saint John, N.B., was the guest speaker last evening at a supper meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held in the Baptist Church hall.

In his address dealing with traffic safety, Mr. Jamer stated that during the last year some 150,000 tourists entered this country via the province of New Brunswick and "we in this country have a great responsibility to these visitors". He suggested that Boards of Trade get together and take the initiative to formulate a program to make highways safe for traffic.

Regarding the matter of road signs, he pointed out that 35 of the 48 states in the U. S. A. have adopted uniform signing, respecting their size, shape, color, location and height. In Canada, he said, two provinces, British Columbia and New Brunswick, have adopted this national signing. Referring to the death rate in the U. S. A. he said the rate per 10,000 is 7.07. In the province of New Brunswick the rate is 13.4, almost double the American average and only one province in Canada surpasses this record and that is the province of Quebec. It is up to the provinces, he said, to get together and do something about this condition, to do something to get some uniformity in traffic regulations.

He said that in the province of New Brunswick "Highway Traffic" has been added to the curriculum for grades 1 to 7 and next year it will be extended to grades 7 to 9. He contended that an educational program is the only type of program that will pay dividends. "Such a program gets directly at you and me," he said.

He concluded by saying that "Highway traffic is good business, its everybody's business, the kind of business that may save your life".

During the evening a very interesting film on the important rules to be observed in driving was shown.

Mr. Alan Holman, president of the Board presided and at the conclusion of the speaker's address he extended to Mr. Jamer the thanks of the Board for coming to Summerside to deliver such an important message.

The very enjoyable banquet was catered to by the ladies of the Baptist Church.

Trade Minister Howe, in charge of Canada's grain marketing, told the Commons Monday he and Labor Minister Gregg expect to see grain flowing out of the elevators again on Wednesday.
