

JUNIOR RED CROSS DELEGATE RETURNS

Two teen agers from different parts of the world are joined together here by the Red Cross at the first Junior Red Cross International Study Center ever to be held in the United States. For 12 days, 110 students worked and studied together at Hood College, Frederick, Maryland, exchanging information about their respective countries and learning about the world-wide Red Cross movement.

Fighting In Gaza Strip Continuing

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt said Israeli troops in two attacks killed nine Egyptian soldiers in the Gaza strip Friday. There was a third outbreak of firing later and reports indicated it was continuing, a spokesman said. Israel had reported three Israeli soldiers and a woman killed

Thursday in the ambush of a bus in a Negeb Desert area southeast of the Gaza strip lately troubled by "infiltrators from Egypt."

These events, as described by spokesmen for the two countries, followed a pattern that brought Egypt and Israel near to war last April.

The new flareup was the worst since Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold of the United Nations allayed that threat by arranging a ceasefire effective April 19.

An official Egyptian source said an Israeli patrol crossed the armistice demarcation line Friday,

shot at Egyptian positions and killed three soldiers. Later, he declared, Israeli soldiers ambushed an Egyptian military vehicle in the same vicinity and killed six other Egyptian troops.

Of Thursday's incident, an Israeli Army spokesman in Jerusalem said the four were killed and seven Israelis wounded by gunmen who hid in a ditch and fired at the bus as it passed through a canyon.

The bus was en route from Tel Aviv southward to the Israeli port of Eilat on the Red Sea Gulf of Aqaba, where Israel borders Jordan on the east and Egypt on

the west.

Earlier, five Israelis were wounded when a civilian truck hit a mine in another part of the desert.

Hammarskjold Friday was investigating the incidents reported by Israel. In announcing the inquiry Thursday, he said he would wait until its finish before saying what measures of punishment should be applied.

The UN Security Council had just voted to send him on a mission to reduce tensions on Arab Israeli demarcation lines when the April flareup between Egypt and Israel took place.

EITHER BEARD OR MESSENGER OUT

TORONTO (CP)—Either his beard or bank messenger Tony Brady must go, said the second assistant manager of the Imperial Bank of Canada branch in downtown Toronto. Tony, lovingly feeling the first fuzz of a week's growing, plunked for the beard. "It's a matter of honor," he said Friday with a hairy smile. "If women in our office are permitted to dye their hair without censure, then I don't see why I should be discriminated against." The 22-year-old \$37-a-week messenger said he believes the beard will improve his appearance and he intends to keep it.

Ask Probe Of Halifax Housing

HALIFAX (CP) — The city health department has been asked to investigate a statement by Dr. Gordon Stephenson of Toronto that some Halifax tenements are "not fit for animals." Alderman discussed Dr. Stephenson's remarks at a city council meeting Thursday night and asked for names and addresses of the properties. The Toronto man, making a housing survey for the city, told the public housing committee Wednesday that good farmers wouldn't keep their livestock in some slum properties. "His recommendations are premature," said Ald. Abbie Lane. They were similar to the "garbage heap" stories about Halifax during the Second World War. "He's only covered part of it so far," said Ald. J. E. (Gee) Ahern. "We have many filthy places in the city of Halifax that should not be tolerated."

Four Seaway Contracts Signed

MONTREAL (CP) — The St. Lawrence Seaway Authority Friday announced signing of four contracts, with total value of nearly \$8,000,000, bringing to \$148,000,000 the value of contracts the authority has awarded to date.

The new contracts are: Maritime Steel and Foundries, Ltd., New Glasgow, N.S., \$2,280,460, for supply and erection of wire rope fenders at seaway locks.

Canadian Vickers, Ltd., Montreal, \$1,508,520, for supply and installation of operating machines for lock gates.

Dominion Bridge Co., Ltd., \$2,589,477, for supply and erection of sector gates at Cote Ste. Catherine lock, Upper Beauharnois lock and Iroquois lock.

S. D. Miller and Sons, Montreal South, Ville Jacques Cartier, St. Lambert and Preville in the Lachine section of the seaway.

One Third Of "Arranged" Marriages End On The Rocks

CAIRO (AP) — Whether a young man gets himself a beautiful wife in the Middle East often depends on his mother's glib tongue rather than his good looks. Family arranged marriages are still by far the custom in Egypt. A young man anxious to get married customarily runs for mother. If he has a girl in mind—he does not have to know her personally—he sends his mother to propose to the girl's mother. Whether the proposal is a success depends on the mother's glibness and often the other woman's glibness. LOVE IS SECONDARY The man's looks or how the girl may feel about him are of secondary importance in this venture. What matters most is social status, financial situation and family background. If these are made attractive enough, the chances are the mother has got her son a bride. The mother sometimes takes her son along for the proposal. The chosen girl hovers in the next room trying to snatch a

at her suitor. Many an Egyptian girl saw her husband for the first time through a keyhole. If the son has no particular mind, the mother usually do-s. The beauties of "bint al jiran"—daughter of the neighbor—have been sung in many Arab love verses. This is natural in a country where mixing of the sexes is restricted and open windows on hot nights afford a good view. Even after the official engagement, some couples are not al-

lowed to meet alone without almost every relative and his brother present. Some girls are chaperoned up to the wedding night when they find themselves alone for the first time with their husbands. How successful are these marriages? Apparently not very. Thirty five per cent of marriages in Egypt end on the rocks. The major cause of divorce, according to government statistics, is "hate and disharmony."

The Dominion Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture, will hold Illustration Station Field Days on the following dates—rain or shine:

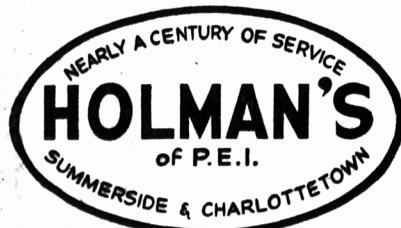
