The possibility that Prince of Wales College may soon be raised to university status was seen yesterday as Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, spoke in the debate on the Speech from the Throne in the Legislature. This would mean that the college would offer four years of university work. Only the first and second years are available in the province. Dr. Dewar said the time has come to examine the role of the college in the province's educational picture, and added that a group of interested citizens will soon present a brief to the government outlining what they feel should be done with the college.

Grand Dominion Steer Brings Record High Bid



\$2.17 A Pound Paid By Dominion Stores

A record \$2.17 per pound was paid by Dominion Stores Limited yesterday for the grand champion of the P.E.I. Easter Beef Show and Sale held in the coliseum at the provincial exhibition grounds in Charlottetown. The Aberdeen Angus steer, owned by George Kelly, Morell, weighed 1,000 pounds and sold for \$1,947.81. The per pound price is the highest in the 12-year history of the annual beef show and sale. Last year's top price, a record then, was \$1.13 per pound. Yesterday, one of the largest crowds ever to attend the event according to a sale secretary David Peacock, watched 22 buyers bid a total of \$22,811.18 for the 84 steers on sale. Average prices worked out to 32.7 cents per pound, which is 1.48 cents higher than last year's average and is also believed to be an all time high. According to agricultural officials, this year's average price was slightly higher than the average paid at a recent similar livestock sale in Nova Scotia. The Nova Scotia average is believed to be 32.2 cents per pound.

Eight Children Family's Homeless After Fire in Morel

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kenny and their eight children were left homeless when fire ravaged their home at Morel Rear yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Kenny and two or three of the children, the oldest of which is 11, are reported to have suffered a few minor burns. At the time of the blaze, shortly after 2 p.m., Mrs. Kenny and her children were upstairs confined to bed with the flu. For the past several days Mr. Kenny has been confined and today was the first on which he was able to be up and around. Mr. Kenny said that he had left the house a short time before the fire, and had first stopped to look in on the livestock, and that he had then gone to visit his parents in the barn and that the house is located about 50 feet from the destroyed building.

Mac's Car Is Rocked By Anti-Nuclear Mob

BRIMLEY, England—Some policemen last night belatedly in the clash. Demonstrators Friday night rocked and buffeted the car containing Prime Minister Macmillan and his wife after he defended Britain's nuclear deterrent in a speech here. Macmillan told a Conservative party rally in this southern England town it was wrong for Britain or Europe to rely solely on the U.S. nuclear deterrent. Extra police were rushed to the scene when 150 bath-tub supporters gathered outside the hall, waiting for the prime minister to leave. The demonstrators surrounded him. The anti-nuclear demonstrators prevented the prime minister, with Lady Macmillan at the wheel, from driving away. They rocked and buffeted Macmillan's car for several minutes until police cleared a path for it. 14 Killed, 19 Injured
