TORONTO (CP)—The stock market struggled to its 11th straight advance Tuesday in light trading. Western oils managed to spur a little at the close but base metals lost some ground at the same time.

The market opened narrowly higher and added to the early gains until mid-afternoon. Then it took a downward turn, rallied a little and was stepping lower at the close.

Observers said the irregular trend was to be expected after the advance the market had undergone during the last two weeks.

Senior base metals moved in a fractional range while junior losses touched 15 cents and gains 45 cents. Western oil losses moved in the latter held a slight majority.

Index changes: golds off 10 to 77.00; base metals up .41 to 236.95; western oils up .21 to 163.42.

Montreal Stocks

MONTREAL (CP)—The Montreal and Canadian Stock Exchanges held an irregular pattern throughout a moderate session of industrial trade Tuesday. Price changes ranged to a point at the close.

International Nickel gained a point and Aluminum 1/4 in a firm base metal section. McColl dropped 1/4 but other refining oils tacked on minor fractions. Trans Mountain and Interprovincial were point winners in pipe steel. Senior western oils dipped minor fractions while juniors eased in a 20-cent range.

Banks were down from their log but still firm in plus ground as Nova Scotia and Toronto-Dominion gained major fractions. Papers were mixed in a 1/4-point range with rice up and International down.

Algonia added 1/4 in spotty steel section while utilities dipped in a 1/4-point range. CPR climbed 1/4 in carriers.

Mines showed Quebec Copper ahead 19 cents, Quebec Chib 15 and Tache 7. Losses were generally under 5 cents in the section. Omipexa Explo-ers gained 1/4 in seniors.

The exchanges closed averages show banks up .23 at 55.32, utilities off .01 at 135.8, industrials up .02 at 296.9, combined up .01 at 243.2, papers up .85 at 1427.83 and golds unchanged at 74.19.

NEW YORK (AP)—Rains improved but industrials sagged again in Tuesday's irregular stock market.

Key issues posted gains of 100 cents ranging from fractions to around a point.

Leading steels, oils and circulators took losses. But there were good gains among aluminum and sugars.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dipped 30 cents to \$181.25 with the industrials down \$1.00, the rails up 50 cents and the utilities up 20 cents.

Among Canadian issues on the New York Stock Exchange, Aluminum Ltd. moved ahead 1/4, Dominion Canadian Pacific gained 1/4, Dornier Mines was up 1/4, Granby Mining and International Nickel.

Dilliers-Seagrams was down 1/4, Brazilian Traction dropped 1/4, and Canadian Marconi was off 1/4 on the American exchange. Most other Canadian issues were unchanged except for Wilrich Petroleum which gained 1-16.
