Gives Hospital Inspection Report

ST. ANDREWS, N.B. (CP)—More hospitals will be inspected for accreditation in the Maritime provinces this summer than in any other area of North America, Dr. Charles U. Letourneau of Chicago told the Maritime Hospital Association Thursday.

Dr. Letourneau, secretary of the American Hospital Association's council on provincial practice, said Canadian hospitals are inspected for this classification about every 18 months. Nearly 50 per cent of those eligible in the Maritimes will be inspected this summer.

Requirements include accord between hospital personnel and staff members, and maintenance of adequate records. A hospital also must contain more than 25 beds and must have been open a year before it may be accredited.

Accreditation, Dr. Letourneau explained, sets minimum standards for a hospital and enables inspection as well as suggestions for improvement.

Vote To End McCarthy Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Republicans on the McCarthy-army committee voted Thursday night to wind up the televised hearings as soon as cross-examination of Senator Joseph McCarthy (Rep. Wis.) and two aides has been completed.

The 4-to-3 vote came after McCarthy demanded the oath that "improper pressure" charges hurled at him by army officials, and said the Democrats and several key figures in the Eisenhower administration must share the blame for the charges being filed.

The three Democrats on the Senate investigations subcommittee held out to the end for calling additional witnesses, including Clark Clifford, onetime aide to President Truman; Maj.-Gen. Kirke Lawton, commander of Ft. Monmouth, N.J.; and Pte. G. David Schindler, a millionaire draftee whose army career is at the heart of the controversy.

The majority prevailed, however, and barring a change in plans the curtain will ring down after all senators and the army side have completed questioning McCarthy and aides Roy M. Cohn and Francis P. Carr.

Russia Buys Canadian Barley

OTTAWA, (CP)—Russia has purchased about 1,000,000 bushels of Canadian barley, it was learned Thursday.

Trade Minister Howe gave a hint of this in the Commons when he informed Donald Fleming (PC—Toronto Eglinton) that "we are selling grain to Russia."

"Oh, jolly little Canadian grain is going to Russia," replied Mr. Fleming. "You can almost put it in a hat."

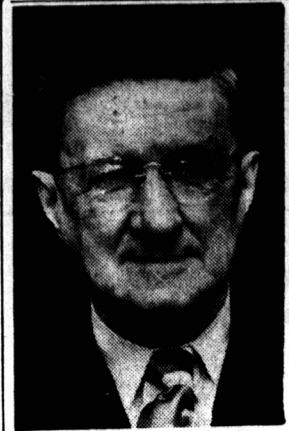
"No, no, in two or three ships," said Mr. Howe.

Later, outside the Commons it was learned that Russia placed orders for two shipments of Canadian barley totalling about 1,000,000 bushels.

Russia is believed to have paid about \$1 a bushel for the grain.

All parts Of Diocese To Be Represented In Funeral Procession

The remains of the late Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown left Montreal yesterday en route to this city. They arrived in the Quebec City by air from London, where Bishop Boyle died while on his way to Rome, and have been accompanied by Monsignor Patrick McMahon, D.D., on the return. Fr. McMahon flew to London when word was received that His Excellency's condition was growing worse.

When the train bearing the remains arrives early tomorrow evening there will be a great throng on hand for the funeral procession. Representatives from all parts of the diocese will be present as the procession moves to St. Dunstan's Basilica where it will disband. The remains will be taken to the Funeral Home before being returned to the Bishop's Residence where they will remain Saturday and Sunday. The late Bishop Boyle will lie in state at the Basilica Monday and until the funeral Tuesday morning.

For the funeral it is expected that in addition to those coming from other parts of Canada all members of the Diocese here will attend the ceremony.

R.C.A.F. Tests New Equipment In Far North

Two R.C.A.F. Lancaster bombers have just returned from Northern Canada where a series of training and experimental flights have been carried out.

The aircraft, operated by the Central Navigation School, Summerside, P.E.I., are sent each year on flights in the Arctic as part of a special training course for selected navigators. They are also assigned to aid the navigator under the difficult conditions experienced.

This year's operation includes testing of two new instruments developed by Computing Devices of Canada Ltd., Ottawa. One of these, details of which cannot be released yet, is intended to improve the accuracy of the aircraft's compass.

The second instrument, the great circle computer, is intended to assist both pilot and navigator in flying the shortest distance between two points.

Computing Devices of Canada Ltd., an entirely Canadian company, produced these instruments under a contract let by the RCAF as part of the government's policy of developing an all Canadian aircraft industry.

The polar flight on which these computers were tested included stops at Frobisher Bay, and Resolute Bay, N.W.T., deep in the Canadian Arctic. The mission also included flying over the North Pole, giving navigation students the unique problem of flying from the point at which all directions are south.

Another problem which was experienced by the navigators who were under the command of S/L White, Central Navigation School, Summerside, was the unreliability of magnetic compasses close to the magnetic pole.

Thees and other conditions peculiar to flight in the Canadian north have caused the RCAF to initiate an extensive development programme involving both private industry and government agencies. The instruments produced by Computing Devices of Canada represent one phase of this work.
