NOT AFRAID OF RATS.

At Least One Lady Was Calm While Others Screamed.

An incident occurred in Parkland recently that discounts the story of the tenderfoot who sat quietly in a saloon while two cowboys emptied their revolvers at each other. It had been decided to scare the tenderfoot by having a sham shooting scrape take place in his presence, but he had been posted by a friend as to what was to be done, and when the real thing took place he sat with his feet upon a card table calmly smoking a cigar while the bullets flew all around him. The story of his bravery spread rapidly, and he was after that a hero in the eyes of the western cowboys among whom he had come to live.

The Parkland episode has in about the same manner made a heroine of a prominent Fourth avenue lady. She and a friend were calling on a lady friend in Parkland who has a 12-year-old son, who of late has been taking lessons in elocution. The boy had developed remarkable talent in that line, and when the callers came the proud mother made it a point to mention the fact that her son was taking lessons in elocution and to tell of the rapid progress he was making. Finally one of the ladies expressed a desire to hear the boy recite. This was just what the fond mother wanted her to do, and the young hopeful was called into the parlor. He began reciting a selection of James Whitcomb Riley's entitled "Satin Things," and just as he got to the part, "I'm not afraid of rats an mice an things 'at girls is skeerd of," a huge rat darted out of the pantry through the dining room and across the parlor to a hole left by a gas pipe, creating great consternation. The ladies jumped upon chairs, gathered their skirts about them and screamed like Comanche Indians, while the boy ran after the rat in a frantic effort to kill it. The Fourth street lady, who is nearsighted, sat quietly rocking herself in a comfortable rocker until the excitement had partially subsided, when she calmly remarked that "it was very good." She thought that the boy had thrown a toy rat from his pocket and that the rest of the party were assisting in that part of the performance. The story of her bravery has been spread among her friends and she is now regarded as a heroine.—Louisville Dispatch.

Points About Terrapin.

Terrapin begin laying about the middle of May and hatch in about 80 days. The female terrapin scratches a hole in the sand with her forepaws, deposits her eggs, from 13 to 19, in it, and then covers them up and leaves the heat of the sun on the sand to hatch out the young terrapins.

They are not much bigger when hatched than a man's thumb nail, and are as soft as dough. They crawl around pretty lively and begin to hunt for their food, consisting of small fish, crabs, etc. The first summer they are quite small, and about the first of the middle of November they go into their winter quarters. These consist of some soft mudhole in the marsh or on the bottom of some stream. Here they sleep until about the middle of April or later, when they come out and are of quite respectable size, say 4 inches in breadth. The next year they are 6 inches and the third 7 inches in breadth.

It is undoubtedly while the terrapin slumbers in the mud that he acquires the peculiar qualities for which we admire him. It is the only flesh known which one can crush in his mouth with his tongue without the aid of his teeth. The other animals run about, sleeping only at night. The terrapin sleeps night and day for six or seven months of the year and takes his night naps, too, for the balance of the year.

An old islander volunteers the information that there are two favorite ways of cooking them—to take the terrapin meat after it is taken from the shell and put it in some fat pork and pie dough and make a terrapin pie. This is the very best way, but if the person who is to do the eating is poorly then it should be stewed with just the terrapin meat alone and a little clear soup mingled with it.—Baltimore Sun.
