Reds Seal Off North Indo China From Free World

DO SON PENINSULA, North Indochina (AP)—It took Ho Chi Minh's Communist-led troops nearly eight years to get North Indochina from the French.
It took his Vietnam only a few hours Friday to seal it off from air and telegraphic communication with the free world while a spreading police hunt sowed fear and suspicion among its 13,000,000 people.
Before the last of the French Expeditionary Corps had vanished from the heart of the once gay maritime hub of Haiphong, an order was broadcast for the people to engage in self-denunciation and to denounce others who had helped in the fight against Ho.
Persons who opposed Ho or were suspected of working too closely with the French were hunted in every village, town and city of the rich Red River delta.
All public buildings, transportation and communication centres in Haiphong were placed under heavy guard while a hunt was launched for pillagers and saboteurs.
"Peiping radio announced that the French troops reached the wharf area and 'Haiphong was completely liberated' at 4 p.m. Friday.

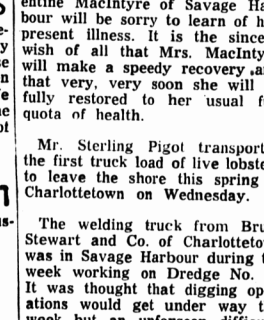

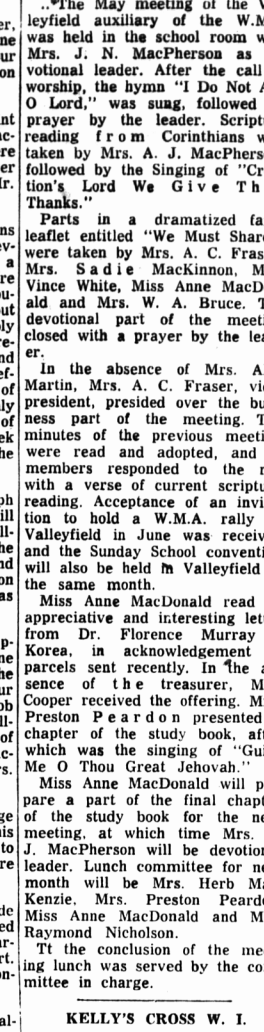
