DAMAGE BY RAIN.—The rains of last week caused a rise in the streams of some parts of the Island, and the very heavy rain of Sunday caused a freshet which washed out many of the mill dams in the country. The dam over Haywood's mill stream, Mill River, was one of those carried away, and its proximity to the railway caused a washout in the embankment of the road and slight damages to the railway bridge over that stream, which have since been repaired.

CYCLONE.—A veritable cyclone, accompanied by thunder and high tiding and a tremendous downpour of rain, passed over a portion of western Prince County on Sunday last. The hurricane came from the northwest, and struck heaviest in the vicinity of Bloomfield and the junction of the O'Leary and Western Roads. Luckily, it was confined to narrow limits, covering an area of not more than five miles in length and one mile in width, so that the damage is not very heavy. A barn blown down, a house and a barn unroofed, a portion of a schoolhouse carried away, and fences and trees in the path of the storm levelled to the ground, are some of the disastrous effects reported. We are pleased to learn that the crops in the district over which it passed escaped unharmed.

THE RIFLE.—No. 2 Battery made some good practice yesterday, Gunner Prowse leading off with 81 points, closely followed by Gunner Ramsay with 80 and Gunner Johnson 79. This was the third match in their competition. The top men in the aggregate are Gunner Ramsay, Sergt. Alley and Gunner Johnson. The final match is to be fired next Monday. The scores are close, and the fight for first place will be hot. It is suggested that a match be arranged between teams from the two city Batteries. It used to be said of our Artillerymen that they were better at the big gun than at the rifle. But they can hold their own against all-comers now, as their scores at the Provincial and League matches show.

A BIG STEAL.—The snug sum of \$75 was stolen from the residence of Mrs. Martina Coady, Great George Street, yesterday. The money was taken from a small box or safe, which was kept in a drawer in Mrs. Coady's bed-room, and was not missed until last evening. The amount was made up of \$5 and \$10 notes. Yesterday afternoon a young woman who lived with Mrs. Coady suddenly announced her intention of going to Boston, and took the train for Summerside at half-past four with the intention of crossing over in the steamer to Point du Chene this morning. As such as Mrs. Coady missed the money she connected the young woman in question with the theft, and swore out a warrant for her arrest. This warrant was given to Police Sergeant Bradley to execute, and he left for Summerside in the early train this morning.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Northwestern Crops.

TORONTO, Aug. 25.

Nicholas Flood Davin, M. P., in a letter to the papers, says he has figured out with Supt. Whyte, of the C. P. R., the amount the Northwest and Manitoba farmers will receive for their crop. The value of wheat alone they place at sixteen million dollars.

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.

Telegrams from Professor Saunders, who is now in the Northwest, confirm previous reports as to the small effect produced by the recent frosts on the wheat crop of the prairies.

Ship Owners' Manifesto.

MELBOURNE, Aug. 25.

The ship owners of Melbourne and Sydney, whose business is greatly interfered with by the demands of the Seaman's Union, have addressed a letter to the Union refusing to employ any officer belonging to the Union, on the ground that such a course would be utterly subversive of discipline. The letter added that the average profits of trade is under 5%, and that compliance with the demands of the men would entail an annual loss of \$200,000. The only alternative is to lay up the vessels. Non-union labor is abundant in Sydney.

Switchmen's Strike.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.

At two o'clock this afternoon the strikers' committee reported to the stock yards that the strikers switching association had decided to accept the proposition of the switchmen in which they ask for 29 cents an hour for engineers, and 18 cents for firemen. The engineers and firemen at once went to work at the advanced wages. This evening the switchmen struck for an increase of 3 cents an hour, and the stock yards of the railroads are again tied up.

A Dangerous Obstruction.

CHATHAM, Mass., Aug. 25.

United States Engineer Rostock, from Newport, who has been examining the wreck of the schooner Weybossett, reports a very dangerous obstruction about 700 feet south-west of the bell buoy north of Pollock Rip Lightship. The wreck lies directly in the best water across the channel, making it necessary for captains to keep a sharp look out till the Government buoys or destroy it.

Connection Made.

SARNIA, Aug. 25.

To-day connection was made between the two ends of the Grand Trunk tunnel under the St. Clair River. At noon men were able to walk through the tunnel the entire distance from Sarnia to Port Huron.

A Total Loss.

HALIFAX, Aug. 25.

The American ship Parker M. Whitmore, ashore at Lockport, will prove a total loss. She is now full of water. Her crew and ship stores were landed safely.

Incendiary Fires.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Aug. 25.

Three incendiary fires have been started in this city since Saturday night. The fires were extinguished without doing much damage.

BAD POTATO CROP.—The Londonderry, Ire., Sentinel prints reports from its correspondents in 25 centres of population in Donegal. These reports attest the ravages of the potato blight in the poverty-stricken and congested districts of Falcarraga and Gweedore. The crop is almost a total failure, and the outlook is worse than at any time since the famine year of 1846.

ACCIDENTALLY POISONED.—It is reported that some of the members of a family living at Tryon and one or two of their friends had a narrow escape from death by poisoning recently. It appears that they ate some raspberries picked in a field adjoining a potato patch which had been sprinkled with Paris Green, and some of the "bug medicine" must have been accidentally placed upon the berry bushes. A short time after eating the berries the people took sick and began vomiting. A medical man was summoned but by the time he arrived on the scene the dangerous period was past, the vomiting having saved their lives. Paris Green is a very good antidote for the potato bug, but the greatest care should be exercised in using it.

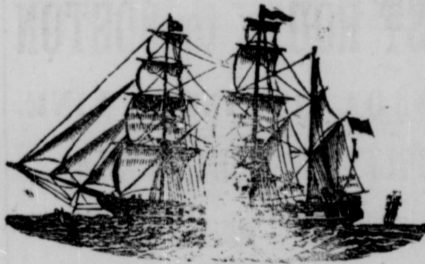
