20th Anniversary Of Montague Legion Branch Observed Last Night

Arms were linked in fellowship, and the old songs of two wars rang out at the Legion Home last evening as the members of the Montague Branch, No. 28, of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L. observed the twentieth anniversary of the granting of the charter. The conviviality and comradeship in evidence last evening recalled to both old and new veterans the years spent in comradeship while serving in the armed services, and evoked a tone of sorrow of those former days were vivified, and past glories were relived as the soldiers of two wars gathered together to commemorate the work done by the Legion since its inauguration.

Sixteen of the original thirty-five charter members were present at the function last evening where they were honoured befitting members whose foresight in forming the branch had been justified by deeds accomplished during the years of its existence.

saw the man between the front and rear wheels on the pavement. Everyone got out of the truck with the exception of Mr. MacPhee, who asked the witness to call her sister in Charlottetown as she was upset and not feeling well. When the witness returned the Police were there.

Weather Misty

Mr. MacPhee, the witness said seemed alright on the way home, the weather was misty and they were driving at between 25 and 30 miles per hour.

Mr. Stewart MacKay of Hopefield confirmed the evidence of the previous witness regarding the rate of speed the truck was travelling and told the jury that he thought the truck was "just about" past the parked vehicle when the man stepped out in front of the truck. "He struck him in an instant after that," he said. The witness said that the condition of Mr. MacPhee appeared normal and that they were not driving fast. He remained on the scene until the "Mounties" arrived.

Mrs. Leon MacPhee told the jury that all she saw as they neared the scene of the accident was a glimpse of a man in front of the truck. She screamed and saw the man drop in front of the truck. The condition of her husband was normal, she said.

Ernest White of Charlottetown said he was proceeding to Charlottetown when he came upon the accident. The two trucks were in such a position as to block his passing. He got out and found the victim was still alive. He went to the house the victim's brother was phoning from and then came back. The deceased's brother, Harry Acorn, said his brother was still alive. The police came in less than five minutes and he remained to assist in directing traffic.

Mr. Harry Acorn of Cambridge said that he and his brother were selling fish for fox or pig feed at the farms along the road. He had stopped his truck in front of Blake Wood's home and his brother had started into the Wood's farm. He (the brother) went around the back of the truck and the witness heard a thump. He looked around and his brother rolled ahead of the truck. The truck, he said stopped about thirty yards beyond where he had been parked. The witness thought the driver of the truck had been drinking as he "looked stupid and made no effort to call the police."

Questioned by Mr. Nicholson the witness could not say for sure that there was anything in particular about the look of Mr. MacPhee to indicate that he had been drinking.

Cst. Charles Walper of the Charlottetown Detachment of the R.C.M.P. produced photographs of the scene of the accident and described relative distances represented in the photos to the members of the jury.

Mr. George Clow, an automobile mechanic of Charlottetown, told the jury that he examined the truck driven by Mr. MacPhee and said that on test it took approximately 21 yards to stop it at 20 miles per hour. The shoes had been pretty well worn out and the master cylinder did not contain any fluid. There was a leak in one of the rear wheels which he considered to be gradual. When the cylinder was filled the truck would stop in eleven yards.

Police Evidence

Cpl. Douglas Watson, R.C.M.P., Charlottetown, told the jury that

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
