Bucceroni Gets Jump On Charles

MILWAUKEE, (AP)—Dan Bucceroni, the stand-up beller from Philadelphia, gets the jump on Ezzard Charles in their race for a shot at Rocky Marciano's heavyweight title when he fights tonight here Tuesday night.

The International Boxing Club is said to be contemplating a Marciano-Charles title bout in early April, but the former heavyweight champion from Cincinnati first must dispose of kayo-minded Bob Satterfield in Chicago Jan. 13.

Bucceroni figures he can put the pressure on the Marciano camp by trimming the 6-3 1/2-inch, 215-pound Ten Hoff.

Bucceroni, Danny Nardicio and Nino Valdes have been mentioned as Marciano's next foe at Miami in February.

Bucceroni, 26, has a six-year advantage on Ten Hoff, but at 190 will be spotting the rugged German about 25 pounds. Butcher Roy Dan, with 45 victories against only three defeats, won his last outing by stopping shop-worn Freddie Beshore.

But he looked far less impressive in that November bout than did Charles in his last fight in which he blasted young Coley Wallace in San Francisco.

Against Bucceroni, ranked No. 1 contender by the National Boxing Association, Ten Hoff will take a 33-34 record, including five straight knockouts over second rates since his arrival in the U. S. last February.

Oldtime Track Bicycle Racing

While reading the review of sports in Canada for 1953 I failed to find any reference to track bicycle racing during the year. Aspects of these events, which were complete without bicycle races, in fact they were probably the most important part of the events.

On August 11th 1953, the first M. P. A. sanctioned sports in the Maritimes were held at Summerside and the main competition was in the bicycle events, especially those in which Lorne Unsworth of Charlottetown and F. H. Cannon of Summerside took part. Other taking part were the cook boys, W. B. Prowse and several others from Charlottetown. Summerside was represented by Cannon, A. C. Saunders and E. Bryan.

Unsworth won the quarter, the half and the five mile events while Cannon took the one, two and three mile events. Similar events were held at Charlottetown, Moncton, Halifax and St. John in following years with Unsworth taking several Maritime Championships.

In 1953 the Island was invaded by competitors from the other Provinces, around the first of August 1953 a meet was held at Summerside when a new Maritime record for the mile of 2:14 was established by W. F. Mitchell of Guelph, Ont.

At the electric light sports held at the grounds of the Charlottetown A. A. on Aug. 11th of that year there were competitors present from Guelph, Ont., Moncton, St. John, Halifax and Boston.

Those present were Dick and Frank Mitchell from Guelph, Fred Scott, W. H. Davidson and D. Stanley from Moncton, I. W. McKinnon from Montreal and J. W. McGowan and M. J. Gillis from Boston. Islanders taking part in the events were F. R. Newsome, Pictou and Bryon Brown, L. A. Soller, A. Gaudet and C. M. Clark of Charlottetown. There do not seem to have been any riders from Summerside nor is there any mention of Cannon or Unsworth taking part in this meet.

In nearly all the events the visitors were too much for the Island boys, the Mitchells taking most of the events.

It was at this meet that Frank Mitchell, paced by a tandem, established a new Maritime record of 2:06 1/2 for the mile.

The sport continued for several years but gradually seemed to diminish, at the turn of the century The Brown boys Pictou and Byron divided the Maritime Championships between them at Moncton but this seems to be near the end of this great branch of sport, and by 1905 or thereabouts seemed to have lost interest.

The last appearance of the two great competitors, Unsworth and Cannon was at the Old Home Week sports at Summerside in 1904 when Unsworth won two match races, a mile and a two mile race. This year I notice that the sport is trying to be revived, there being two races at the Labor Day meet at Charlottetown; otherwise nothing but road races seem to be sanctioned.

The Mitchell brothers came to the Island representing Canada in the Island representing Canada Cycle & Motor Co., who manufactured the famous Red Bird racer.

Under the capable management of the ice committee headed by Mr. James Larkin, the Montague Curling Club already has sufficient ice to begin curling as soon as the present inclement weather passes and colder weather makes sufficient frost in the ice to enable the ice maker to pebble.

The committee, and in particular the ice-maker, are to be congratulated in having the ice made and marked out at this early date, which although is later than many earlier years, is three days ahead of the opening date of last year except for trouble with the pump which happened twice on the cold-est nights of the season and insufficient water was available on these nights to flood. A general meeting of the club, which is being held tonight for election of skips and other business, will stimulate interest in the sport and the hope is that a successful season will result with the help of assistance of old man winter.

Ice At Montague Curling Rink

LONDON, (AP)—Undeclared John Kelly, Belfast bantamweight who won the European championship without leaving home, was voted the best young British boxer of 1953 Friday by the Boxing Writers Club. Canada's Coach Confident Of Defeating Russians

TORONTO (CP)—Russia's bark is bigger than her bite as far as Greg Currie is concerned.

The 39-year-old coach of Toronto's East York Lyndhursts, Canadian representative in the 1954 world hockey championships in Stockholm Feb. 26-March 7, said in an interview Monday he is taking the reports of the purported strength of Russia's team "with a grain of salt."

"We haven't seen them play and they haven't seen us, but I can tell you they aren't going to show us anything new. I think our team will take the title."

In Moscow, Rudolf Putte Kock, president of the Swedish AIK Sports Association, said "Russia, which began playing years ago, has mastered the sport "and the day has passed when Canada could send a scrub team to Europe confident that it would be good enough to win... It's their better send a strong team if they want to win."

Currie pointed to his club's record in the Ontario Hockey Association senior B loop this year. In 22 games, it has won 17, lost five and has scored 160 goals—an average of 7.3 goals a game—which Currie says is more than any other club in Canada has done in a similar number of games.

Currie, coach of Lyndhursts the last three seasons, said reports he has received from Europe indicate that Canada's main opposition will come from the Swedish National team, 1953 titleholders. Canada did not send a team last year.

Since 1948 Canada has lost the title only once—in 1949 when Sudbury Wolves failed at world championships in 1950 and 1952 and champions in 1951.

Seventeen Toronto players will make the trip, accompanied by Currie, team manager Don Preston, and W. B. Baldy George, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Russians Use Secret Weapon In Hockey

STOCKHOLM, (AP)—Swedish ice hockey leaders give Russia a good chance of winning the ice hockey world championship in Stockholm Feb. 28 to March 7.

The Swedish AIK team was defeated 1-1 in Moscow Saturday by a Soviet army team.

"The Russians have showed themselves capable of playing really great hockey," Putte Kock, president of the AIK Sports Association, told Stockholm newspapers in telephone interviews from Moscow.

"Personally I believe the Canadians, not to speak of ourselves, have to pick the best possible team to hold their own against the Russians," Kock said.

"There is no doubt that the world championship fight will be a contest between Canada, Russia, Czechoslovakia and Sweden."

Sven Lindquist, Swedish team leader, indicated the Russians were coming to the championships with what Swedish papers called a "secret weapon."

"The Russian equipment is almost like ours," he said, "but their ice skates are sharpened in a different way and have bigger blades."

"This," he said, "enables them to stop dead without circling."

Tennis Stars Scoff At Pro Report Offers

MELBOURNE, (AP)—Australia's 19-year-old tennis twins, Ken Rosewall and Lewis Hoad, and American champion Tony Trabert today scoffed at reports they were being tempted by pro offers.

The Melbourne Herald said Jack Kramer, American promoter, had dangled feelers in front of the game's most notable amateur personalities and that Trabert had expressed interest in the proposition.

Trabert said to think of his turning pro in the near future.

Hoad and Rosewall also denied that they even had been approached regarding pro tennis or that they were interested.

Hoad, star of Australia's 3-2 Davis Cup victory over the United States, appeared dumbfounded at the reports.

"I am not interested in turning pro yet. I have not yet won a international championship. I would like to win Wimbledon and some more Davis Cup matches first."

Rosewall, who defeated Wimbledon champion Vic Seixas in the decisive fifth match Thursday, also said no offer had been put to him regarding turning pro.

"I don't think they want us yet."

The Herald said Kramer, in a telephone interview, expressed interest in Hoad and Rosewall but made no offers. Kramer was quoted as saying he would be interested in Hoad after the Wimbledon tournament, if he was sure Hoad could hold his own with Frank Sedgman, Pancho Gonzales and Pancho Segura.

Sir Norman Brookes, president of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia, said he was certain Hoad and Rosewall were not even considering professional careers.

West Win Shrine Game

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Brilliant passing by Stanford's Bob Garrett and lightning touchdown run by Kansas State's Veryl Switzer sparked the West All-Stars to a stunning 31-7 upset victory over the East Saturday in the 20th annual Shrine charity football game.

Garrett, voted the most valuable player on the field by the sports writers, turned in a dazzling display of passing before a sellout crowd of 62,000, scored a touchdown and twice converted.

Gus Dorais Dies In Michigan

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (AP)—Charles E. "Gus" Dorais, 62, whose "revolutionary" forward passing changed the game of football and started Notre Dame on the path to gridiron greatness, died Sunday.

It was Dorais and the immortal Knute Rockne who discovered in 1913 the forward pass could be used as a lethal weapon in football warfare.

They came east in 1913 with Notre Dame, a comparatively unknown midwestern school, to engage a powerful Army team. It was supposed to be nothing more than a warmup for the cadets.

But when the afternoon sun had settled behind the plains of West Point, Army was a soundly beaten team by the score of 35-13—and the entire football world was talking about Dorais and Rockne.

The forward pass had been used before this game—but the ball was thrown in an underhand method. Nobody had ever seen the likes of Dorais' long, arching overhand tosses.

Dorais completed 12 straight passes to Rockne, who later gained fame as Notre Dame coach, and other teammates.

In addition to starring on the field, Dorais also gained fame as a collegiate coach at University of Detroit and Gonzaga and in pro ranks with the Detroit Lions, retiring in 1947.
