

3.5 Million Voters In Que. May Go To Polls In 1966

QUEBEC (CP) — For the first time, the number of persons eligible to vote in a Quebec provincial election is estimated to exceed 3,000,000 and they may get a chance to cast ballots in the coming year.

Many observers in Quebec say 1966 is the year Premier Jean Lesage will ask for a renewal of the mandate of his Liberal government, which last appealed to the voters in 1962. Mr. Lesage himself has declined comment on predictions of an election next year but René Arsenault, provincial secretary in his government, told some reporters last week that an election could be expected some time between June and December, 1966.

Mr. Arsenault is regarded as a leading electoral strategist on the Lesage team. Mr. Lesage has himself remarked that he can constitutionally hold off on an election until 1968.

Observers in the provincial capital say the government will want to see enacted, before the calling of an election, priority legislation dealing with social programs and to have approved the budget for the fiscal year beginning next April 1.

The Liberals came to power in 1960, one year after the death of Premier Maurice Duplessis, who had ruled since 1944.

Opposition Leader Daniel Johnson, who heads the Union Nationale party, is urging his supporters to get ready for elections that could come in April.

"Before the government is forced to announce a tax increase," But a source in the Union Nationale says Mr. Johnson, in making such predictions, is primarily interested in putting his forces on the battle-alert.

The last budget from Mr. Lesage, who also is Quebec's finance minister, brought a tax increase which he ascribed to "fiscal rearrangements."

Next year's budget is expected to reflect the findings of a provincial royal commission on taxation. The commission is said to be taking a special interest in the lightening of the tax burden on farmers.

Sources close to the commission say the group might recommend the elimination of property taxes levied for school commissions and their replacement with other forms of taxation, less hard on farmers.

This would help the financially hard-pressed residents of some rural areas and thus prove a "gift" to the very element in Quebec society which has been most vocal in its complaints in recent months.

A prime factor in the swelling of voter lists beyond the 3,000,000 mark is the recent extension of the franchise to residents 18 years and older, as opposed to the old minimum age of 21. There were 2,700,000 eligible voters in 1962.

SEATS INCREASED
The number of seats in the next legislative assembly will be increased to 108 from 95.

There now are 62 Liberals in the assembly, 31 Union Nationale members and one independent. One seat is vacant.

In saying he could put off an election until 1968, Mr. Lesage was referring to the Quebec law which fixes the length of a mandate as running from the day the official report of election results is filed.

The official filing usually comes about three weeks after balloting day, which in 1962 fell on Nov. 14.

Mr. Lesage theoretically could put off calling an election until December, 1967, and at least 46 days must intervene between the moment of calling and the day of voting. This would leave voters to go to the polls in 1968.

cause declarer later takes the marked trump finesse against the 10-8 and makes four. Nothing unusual took place, yet the chances are that South would have gone down if West had played a little more shrewdly.

When declarer leads the low spade towards dummy at trick three, West should play at the eight, not the three. East, of course, produces the two.

Now place yourself in declarer's position and remember that he does not see the East-West cards. His only concern is to avoid losing two trump tricks. This can hardly occur if the spades are divided 3-2.

South will therefore take measures to guard against a 4-1 trump break. Being likely to think that West's eight is, either a singleton or part of a 10-8 doubleton.

To cover both cases, and particularly the possibility that East was dealt the A-10-3-2, declarer is likely to lead the king of spades on his first round. This play limits him to one trump loser if East actually has the A-10-3-2.

Once South does this, he is a gone goose. West makes two trump tricks and the contract goes down.

To play the spade three at trick three presents South with no opportunity whatever to go wrong. The eight is the killer-die.

Terror Plans Were Foiled In Indonesia

SINGAPORE (AP)—The Indonesian Communist party leaders of thousands during a massive terror campaign if its coup attempt had succeeded last October, highly reliable sources have reported here.

American, British and other Western diplomats and their families would have been victims of the campaign, they said. This was the story they reported.

Details of the campaign were uncovered recently by the Indonesian Army in the diaries of some 500 Communist party cadres. Information of the contents of the diaries was brought here by diplomats.

The diaries say that the terror campaign would have been launched after the murder of top-ranking army generals Oct. 1.

Seven generals including Army Chief Achmad Yani, were

used by the Communists but the Communist-backed coup was crushed soon after it was launched by forces loyal to Defence Minister Gen. Abdul Harris Nasution.

The diaries say that the campaign would have run from Oct. 3 to 5, culminating in the public execution of 600 "kabitri" in Merdeka Square in the Indonesian capital Jakarta. Kabiri is an Indonesian Communist word

Commodity Exports Up

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian commodity exports in October were valued at \$790,700,000, an increase of 14.8 per cent over October exports last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Monday.

This brought the value of exports for the first 10 months of 1965 to \$7,922,700,000, an increase of 2.6 per cent over the same period of 1964.

Opening lead—king of hearts. Part of the skill in card play consists of causing your opponent to make errors. The more opportunities you create for an adversary to make a mistake, the greater the chance that he will oblige.

South is in four spades and West leads a heart. Let's say that declarer ducks the king and takes the queen. He now leads a low spade. West plays low, and dummy wins with the jack.

Declarer then plays a low spade to the queen, East showing out, and West takes the ace. West cashes the jack of hearts, but is then out of business. be-
