O'Leary Farmers Co-op Reports Successful Year

The O'Leary Farmers Co-operative Association Limited topped the half million dollar mark in sales during the past year and made a net profit of almost \$17,000. It was shown in the financial statement given by Mr. Leo Corcoran at the annual meeting of the Association Thursday night. Total sales for the year ending January 31 amounted to \$511,827.48, an increase of about \$9,000 over last year's sales of \$502,726.60. Net profit amounted to \$16,890.52. Store sales alone amounted to \$126,150.75 and feed sales to \$122,678.87. Sales of other goods were: Eggs, \$56,610.85; poultry, \$13,138.99; hatchery, \$4,870.83; potatoes, \$98,854.12; coal, \$5,171.29; fertilizer and lime, \$41,891; storage rent and grading, \$2,713.36; hay and oats, \$5,990.46; service station, \$24,962.17; limothy seeds, \$9,034.87. The report showed that the Association had a banner year, hitting the highest sales mark in the organization's history. The Association had the biggest turnover of any co-op organization in the province.

About \$10,000 was left in dividends after the income tax, interest on share capital, the reserve and educational funds had been paid. About 10 per cent was rebated back, which would represent about 3 per cent dividend. The store manager, Mr. Bernard Shea, was highly commended for his work throughout the year. The Board of Directors were also thanked in a resolution moved by Mr. Oliver Gorrill, O'Leary. The meeting was held in O'Leary Hall with the president, Mr. Earl Ellis, presiding. A very large crowd was in attendance. Mr. Gerald Gamble was elected president of the Association. Vice president is Mr. Elmer Woodside and the secretary is Mr. Ivan Webb. Two new directors, Messrs. Tennis Peters and Arnold Wood, were appointed. Guest speakers at the meeting were Mr. Jerome O'Brien, President of the Prince Edward Island Co-operative Services and Major Frank MacMillan of Prince of Wales College. Considerable discussion took place at the meeting. Among those taking part were: Messrs. Arnold Wood, Raeford Locke, Melvin Bridges, Oliver Gorrill and Earl Stetson. Messrs. Brent Howatt, President of the Summerside Co-operative and Rodd MacNevin, Manager of the Summerside store, were present.
