Ferguson, and cheers were given for the Queen and the ladies. THE many friends of Capt. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Wolseley to the Front. ANOTHER SKIRMISH. The British Hedged In All Day. A DANGEROUS POSITION. Reinforcements Arriving for Wolseley. A BATTLE PROCEEDING!

Special Despatch to the Examiner. ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 26. On Thursday morning, General Wolseley, together with two thousand men and two guns, proceeded to Magfar, for the purpose of dislodging the enemy from the position they had taken up. After a slight skirmish the positions were soon taken. It was necessary to hold the ground, for here the forces of Arabi were concentrating, and trouble was expected from them, as it was feared that they purposed to break down the bank, and overflow the surrounding country. Soon after the British forces had taken up their positions, the dislodged forces of Arabi were rapidly reinforced by Egyptians from Tel-el-Kebir, where the Rebel had been throwing up entrenchments, expecting to be attacked from the direction of El Kantara. It was soon observable that the forces of the Egyptians now numbered over ten thousand soldiers, and that they had ten heavy guns with them. The British being hemmed in, held their ground valiantly during the whole of the day. The casualties on our side were small, but the full list is not yet known. On Friday, the British forces received reinforcements, and General Wolseley began an attack upon the enemy. The fight was proceeding when the despatch was sent, and the result is not yet known.

Arabi Concentrating at Heliopolis. Arabi After DeLesseps. The British Occupy Maximel.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 25. Arabi's forces are arriving in great numbers towards Heliopolis, a few miles east of Cairo. Arabi has grown very violent towards De Lesseps, and accuses him of acting the part of a treacherous deceiver. Arabi says that the promises of De Lesseps were given for the purpose of selling quietly the navigation of the Canal to the British forces. De Lesseps promised that the canal should not be used for military purposes. The feeling is very bitter against the Frenchman and a high price has been placed upon his head. The British forces are now occupying Maximel.

THE PORTE DENIES AGAIN. Constantinople, Aug. 25. The Porte has formerly denied the reports concerning the murder of Christians at Beyrout, and says that no rising is anticipated from that quarter.

THE RED-THRUSH IN SWEDEN HARD ON THE JEW. AN IRISH ITEM. London, Aug. 25. A terrible epidemic is raging in Malmo, Sweden. The epidemic is the native red-thrush, and it is making sad havoc among those attacked with the disease. News has reached here of the renewal of Jewish outrages in Warsaw. The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland declines to interfere with Justice Lawson's decision in the case of Dwyer Gray.

THE SARATOGA REGATTA. Another Unexpected Result. Saratoga, Aug. 26. Lee won the professional single scull race at the Saratoga Regatta yesterday. Courtney was second. The defeat of Wallace Ross, who was the favorite here, has caused a great deal of surprise, and no little adverse comment.
