Police Seek Young Bandit
Held Up Service Station Saturday Night in Moncton.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, N. B., June 14—Police throughout the Maritime Provinces were watching tonight for a young bandit who held up a service station attendant here last night and escaped without any look after missing a shot with a sawed-off shotgun.

Driving up to one of the Irving Oil Company's service stations at closing time the youthful gunman ordered a gallon of gasoline. He showed the gun against Henry McCair's body while he was making change and commanded him to "sick 'em up."

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, June 16—Authority to go ahead with construction by the Canadian National Railways of 99 miles of line from Rouyn, Que. to Senneterre, on the Transcontinental Line was endorsed by the Commons Railway Commission today. Under the chairmanship of Thomas Wien (Lib., Montreal Outremont), the committee adopted the bill having this for its aim. The line is expected to cost \$5,940,000 and must be finished in three years.
