**SIR CHARLES' OPINION:  
A GENERAL ELECTION.**

SIR CHARLES TUPPER has, since his return to Canada, announced the opinion that there will be a general election before Parliament meets again. To a representative of the Mail and Empire he said, —

"I was not surprised but much gratified to learn from circumstances which have come to my notice since my arrival that there is evidence of a wide-spread revolt throughout the whole Dominion against the present Government. The violation of all their promises and the contempt which they have exhibited for public opinion in the administration of the affairs of the country, taken in conjunction with the seething mass of corruption now being exposed in Ontario, and with which they are regarded as being clearly identified, is undoubtedly driving large numbers of representative Liberals who have formerly supported them from the ranks of the party. If the Government should determine upon an appeal to the people it will, in my judgment, only be the result of a consciousness on their part that in a few months the Local Governments of Ontario and Manitoba are sure to be defeated, and of a desire to anticipate a consummation which would predict a fatal catastrophe to the Federal Parliament. If therefore they carry out what I believe to be their present intention, namely, to hold the elections at an early day in order to avoid the disastrous consequences of the loss of both these provinces, it will result practically in a repetition of the experience of 1878."

Of course Sir Charles Tupper is not in the confidence of the Government; and there is no accounting for any method of right reasoning for many of the Government's actions. But Sir Charles has closely observed the ways of politicians for upwards of fifty years. When he says a general election is likely to take place, it is time for electors to put on their considering caps and decide whether or not they ought to vote in favor of a Government which has been false to almost every principle of the Liberal party and false to almost every promise its members have made—which has been a great disappointment to all honest electors. It is time also for the Liberal Conservatives to nominate their candidates and prepare for the contest

**Sight for the Blind—**

Hearing for the Deaf

LONDON, Sept 21.—The reported discoveries of Mr. Peter Stiens, a Russian scientist, have been occupying some attention in London. Mr. Stiens claims to be able to give artificial sight to the blind by means of an electrical apparatus he has devised. He says the apparatus will, as in a camera, focus the rays of light from the object to the brain, and sight is given, the objects being clearly seen.

A Daily News reporter, who was tightly blindfolded, so all was blackness before his eyes, says that on being connected with the apparatus a dull grey light, succeeded by a clear bright light, took the place of the blackness, and he saw fingers held up before him. Mr. Stiens says he is also engaged on an electrical apparatus by means of which deaf persons will be made to hear perfectly.
