Canadians Restive In Static Warfare On Front In Korea

BY BILL BOSS (ADVANCE) With the Canadians in Korea, July 31 — (CP) — Wear on the nerves has replaced wear on the body in Korea.

While the truce talks go on at Panmunjom, the Korean war has become static, largely removing it from the world's headlines.

Canadian troops newly in the theatre feel they have come after the glory has been harvested.

I chatted with a group of 15 soldiers on their way to a swim parade in a stream near the front.

"The thing is, we feel the people at home just don't care," said one of them, whose home is in Toronto and who has been in Korea three months with the 1st Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment.

Just As Demanding The men's leaders and staff officers at 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade Headquarters say the kind of war now being fought is at least as demanding as the one under way a year ago, and probably more so.

But the tension of waiting has replaced the satisfaction of advancing. Incessant patrolling has replaced the leap-frogging that brought troops and tanks to the front.

The soldier, reading letters from home and glancing through newspapers reaching the front says he feels that only his relatives know Canadians still are here. He says Canada seems to think the fighting is over.

That thought, say staff officers, is confirmed by concert parties and other entertainers who arrive at the front and take it from the very warlike front, with daily and nightly visitations by enemy artillery, mortar and patrols, they suggest, when the point is made, that the Communists would like just that to happen, and would act upon it, seemingly hasn't occurred to them.

During the last year, soldiering as trying as ever has been out of the news. The need for replacement is as great as ever. Casualties from injury, exhaustion and disease continue at rates sometimes higher than an all-out-war.

But a static line has replaced one of movement. There are no changes of position to report.

They had arrived in town that afternoon, and after sleeping the night in the Town Hall, left early the next morning for Borden and the end of a four-day visit to this Province, during which they had

explored the scenic beauty of the area, and maintained the flow of intelligence about the enemy's doings. However, most are uneventful.

The "settled down" atmosphere has transformed the area into a quiet one. It's life by the book again. Red tape has returned.

The free-and-easy life of active campaigning has given way to a roughened version of soldiering at home, except that it's 8,000 miles away and takes its daily toll in sickness, injury and death.

Officers' formal mess dinners—previously great occasions when a battalion was in reserve—now are weekly institutions. Officers of two regiments turn out in serge "blues."

Such a war doesn't produce much news and the soldier knows it. He asks, then, that when the day's communique reports "routine patrolling" or "Enemy artillery activity" across the front, the people back home realize that someone out there is doing it and taking it.

"Back home we used to think this war was over-glamorized," said the man from Toronto.

"Now we know it is. But perhaps it's the only way to keep them remembering that Canadians are here."
