

Ottawa Goes To College To Learn To Stop Sask.

VANCOUVER (CP) — Memories and dreams of champagne were cast aside Wednesday as Ottawa Rough Riders returned to the grim world of football playoffs — a world of aches, bruises and mud.

Fortunately, the aches and pains are few and the mud still is only a probability — not a reality.

The Eastern Football Conference champions worked out the kinks from a tiring 12-hour trip with a light drill after a mid-morning team meeting — a schedule that coach Frank Clair says will likely continue until Saturday's Grey Cup final against Saskatchewan Roughriders.

The Riders arrived Tuesday night after a two-stage flight via Chicago, the only arrangements they could make after the Air Canada machinists' strike disrupted plans for a direct charter trip.

But the practice was almost a tropical holiday for the players who have been used to snow, freezing rain and mud during the eastern finals against Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

The had a temperature in the mid-40s and while the sky was overcast and threatening, the weatherman said the rain would hold off until evening.

The rain could turn Empire Stadium into a giant mud puddle for Saturday, but Clair said his main concern was about the weather at game time.

"As long as it doesn't rain they should be able to keep the ball dry and it should be a wide-open game," said the 50-year-old coach, looking forward to his fourth Grey Cup game. Clair won two Grey Cups in the early 1960s with Toronto Argonauts and while he has

never missed the playoffs in his 11 years in Ottawa, this is only the second time his club has reached the Canadian Football League Final. His 1960 club finished second in the standings but went on to defeat Edmonton Eskimos that year.

Clair says his present club is the best he has coached with "almost perfect balance" between defence and offence as well as running and passing on the attack.

But he retreats behind his glasses and a blank look when asked for a prediction on Saturday's game.

FACE TOUGH TEAM

"It'll be a tough game."

The death of defensive coach Bill Smyth has left a big gap in the Ottawa ranks but in the Hamilton series the defensive squad ran itself, with veteran players taking charge and carrying on the basic assignments Smyth set up for the season.

Clair admits that defending against Saskatchewan will be a tougher problem. Quarterback Ron Lancaster is a better passer than the Hamilton duo of Joe Zuger and Frank Cosentino and the Saskatchewan ground attack led by fullback George Reed and halfback Ed Buchanan "is the toughest we've faced this year."

Clair's biggest problem on defence is middle linebacker Ken

Lehmann, recently named the top lineman in the east. Lehmann suffered a bruised ankle in the opener of the Hamilton series and saw action briefly at the start of the second game.

"It's still sore but I think it will be okay," Lehmann said as he stepped off the plane Tuesday night.

"I'll just have to wait and see how it goes this week."

Mike Walderrak, a 250-pound rookie offensive guard, had a similar problem in the Hamilton series but played throughout and should be in top shape for the game.

FANS DISLIKE GREAT GOLFER

Jack Nicklaus' lack of popularity with the galleries that follow professional golfers around the various courses in the country, manifested itself at Augusta, Georgia, this year.

Playing in the Masters tournament, Nicklaus, endeavoring to reach the 15th green in two shots was too strong and the ball sailed over his objective and onto the 16th fairway towards a water hazard. The crowd was gleeful in Jack's misery and the unkindest cut of all came when one of them hollered boisterously, "Get in the drink, Fat Jack."

It's hard to assess this feeling of animosity towards one of the greatest golfers in history. One would think that being one of the big three in the sport, that Nicklaus would certainly have his share of avid supporters. But it just isn't so. Arnold Palmer and Gary Player seem to have absorbed all of the affection that fandom has to give.

Some buffs are of the opinion that Jack has gotten to where he is with too little effort. At 26, he has won all the major prizes offered in big-time golf and become a millionaire to boot. But more reasonable people know that no-one gets to that plateau without many years of devotion and very hard work. Other think that his size alienates warm regard they seem to classify as the "Big Meanie" that he takes candy from babies, so to speak. Well, Nicklaus can't help his stature, and the others on the pro tour are well able to take care of themselves or they wouldn't be there.

But whatever the cause, it must be a tough thing for Jack Nicklaus to bear. He has the respect, of course, but it's too bad that more people can't find a little warmth for one of the most exciting and explosive players the game has ever produced.

THE NAUSEOUS NETMINDER

Those of us who have but to get up and go to work each morning can be thankful. Naturally, we have our daily obligations to perform before going out to greet the world shortly after each sunrise, or sunset as the case may be.

But Chicago Black Hawk goalie Glen Hall's work starts after each sunset, and he has one extra little task to take care of before going out to earn the bread and butter. He throws up.

Now, there are other people who do this every morning also, but I think it would be safe to assume that the causes are different. Why, I've even known those who bring such a malady on themselves.

Hall, who returned to the Black Hawk fold a short while ago, has been plagued by his nervous stomach ever since he broke into professional hockey back in the '55-'56 season. Most rookies, or for that matter anyone starting a new job, are expected to show signs of nervousness until they become accustomed to their surroundings. But poor Glen Hall just goes on and on having his pre-game meal twice, (once down and once up.)

Even though he was probably offered more money than most of us make in years, coming back to the NHL must have been a most difficult decision for the great goaltender to make. When he announced his retirement this fall, he meant it. But employers being what they are, nobody seemed to have been in their organization for a retired goalie, so he had to go back for another year.

Of course Hall could have found some kind of a job, but he was looking for something that would pay him as much, or almost as much as he received for being shelled with hard rubber for 70 hours a year. Naturally, he wouldn't get that kind of cash for the kind of work available to ex-goaltenders.

It does seem odd, however, that some public relations department didn't snap him up. They are always on the lookout for famous people to say something good about their respective products. Or should that read "fins" products?

Gordie Hannigan, 38, a former Toronto Maple Leaf winger, died of a heart attack in Edmonton last week. Hannigan, whose two brothers Ray and Pat also played in the National League, is survived by his wife and nine children.
