

Local and Other Items.

The Convents re-open on Monday, the 4th instant. LOCAL PAPERS say that cholera is prevalent in Amherst. The St. Peter's School will re open on Monday next, at 10 a. m. EIGHTY scholarships have been provided for the ensuing year at Sackville. The erection of a public hall to seat 1,200 persons is now seriously talked of at Mon. ton. THREE hundred and fifty vessels have arrived at Quebec from sea this season to date. MADAME DE REMUSAT, a granddaughter of Lafayette, has just died at the age of seventy-five years. UPWARDS of 60 per cent. of those attacked by cholera, which is now raging in Japan, succumb to the disease. PICTON mines and New Glasgow manufactures will exhibit at the Dominion Exhibition, Kingston, Ont., Sept. 18th. The wheat crop in almost every wheat growing country in Michigan has been injured by the heavy rains during the harvest. FREDERICTON is anxious about its young men. It ought to be when a system of water works is required to enforce the Scott Act. THIRTEEN Indians who were engaged in the recent rebellion of the Creeks have been punished by public whipping at Little Rock, Arkansas. MR. T. F. DWYER will preach in the Christian Meeting House, Upper Great George Street, to-morrow evening at half-past six o'clock. The wife of the Rev. John C. Berrie, Shediac, is slowly recovering from an attack of typhoid fever. She is still under treatment for bronchitis. PREPARATIONS are being made in San Francisco for the reception of the Canadian Vice-Royal Party by the Caledonian Club and other English and Scotch organizations of San Francisco. THERE is a class of men in Washington who make a fat thing by advancing Government clerks their month's wages and charging them anywhere from five to eighteen per cent. for the time. ON the withdrawal of the Royal Munster Fusiliers from Halifax this month, and its one regiment of the line will remain, and it is not probable a second one will be sent there for some time. ST. JAMES' CHURCH.—The classes of the Sabbath School will be resumed, meeting at 2.30 p. m. The Rev. Mr. Meville, B. D., of Hopewell, N. S., will officiate (D. V.) in this church, on Sabbath evening next. THE General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church has declined to adopt the proposed amendment to the constitution lengthening the duration of a pastor's stay in his charge from three to five years. THE city of Knoxville, U. S., was shocked last Tuesday by a report that Gen. Joseph A. Maber, a prominent politician, had killed D. C. Lusby and his father, Moses Lusby, in the office of the Recorder during a trial. THE brig "Zinga," Callaghan, master, sailed for Liverpool, G. B., on the 2nd inst., with a cargo consisting of 10,750 lbs dead and ends, containing 275,000 feet super-linear measurement, shipped by the owners, Peake Bros. & Co. THE Catholic Church at Petit Rocher has received a chime of three bells, weighing 3700 lbs. No other church in the Province, outside of St. John and Fredericton, can, we believe, boast of more than one bell-world. THE sale of the New Brunswick and Canada Railway to the New Brunswick Railway Company has been completed, the papers having been formally signed, and both roads will now be run by the officers of the latter company. IT seems rather strange that, just opposite the Police Court, just under the noses (so to speak) of the police officers, just at a point which meets the vision of His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate every day, as he begins to ascend to his office, a large pile of rotten logs and other unsightly debris, is piled up in front of a new building—in direct violation of the law. THE Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries has awarded a binocular glass to Captain Erickson, master of the Norwegian ship "Wawaland," in acknowledgment of his kindness to a portion of the shipwrecked crew of the barque "St. Lawrence" belonging to Prince Edward Island, who were picked up at sea and maintained on board of his vessel free of charge from September to the 3rd of October, 1881, when they were landed at New York. KENSINGTON SABBATH SCHOOL PICNIC.—A Sabbath School Picnic was held at Kensington on Wednesday, 23rd ult., by the scholars, teachers, and friends of the Sabbath School of that place. The day was everything that could be desired for the occasion, and all present seemed to enjoy themselves well. After the good things provided by the parents and friends were partaken of, the Rev. Mr. Maggs, who was present, delivered a very pleasing address to the children, which was listened to attentively. A few appropriate pieces were then sung by the Sunday School scholars. After the singing a few games were eagerly contested by the children, and enjoyment to give much amusement and enjoyment to all present. The party dispersed at about six o'clock apparently well pleased with the afternoon's enjoyment. THE Australian cricketers defeated the All England eleven by 185 to 178. The revolted Tunisian tribes who retreated into Tripoli have returned home. THE regular meeting of the Charlottetown Land League takes place on Monday evening. A SON of track master McLellan, formerly of Truro, was recently drowned at New Casle. THE Bible Class will be held as usual, this evening, in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor, at 8 o'clock. JAMES F. CURTIS, Esq., Chief Landing Waiter, left this morning, by "Northern Light," on a tour of inspection, through the U. per Provinces. THE special attention of parties wishing to secure good farms, or business stands at a bargain, is directed to the auction sale at Alberton, on Tuesday next, Sept. 5th. A SPIRITLY SKIRMISH took place to-day at the end of Queen Street. Some sailors and some men at the corners came to a pitched battle. The contest was short and sharp, and order speedily reigned. AN advertisement is published calling for tenders for the erection of a monument to the late Sir George E. Cartier, for which purpose a sum of money was voted during the session of 1881. THE war is having a bad effect on the lumber trade. It has caused a rise in ocean freights; consequently the number of ships coming to Quebec has greatly decreased, which has caused an accumulation of stock. THE civic assessment of Winnipeg shows that the city has increased in value from \$9,000,000 to \$30,000,000. The population of the city has increased from 10,000 to 25,000 in one year. Building operations this year are estimated at nearly \$3,000,000. IN the month of July there were 186 fires in New York city, of which cigars, pipes and cigarettes were carelessly caused twenty-three; children playing with matches, thirteen; matches lying around loosely, igniting rubbish, etc., nine. THE closing session of the American Science Congress in Montreal was held on Wednesday last. The next meeting will be held at Minneapolis. The result of the assembling of the association in Montreal has been to add hundreds of Canadian members to its ranks. REFERENCE to our advertising columns will show that the Railway Department will issue return tickets, at one first class fare, from Charlottetown to Alberton, on Tuesday next, September 5th. The train will leave Charlottetown at 6.45 a. m., arriving at Alberton at twelve o'clock, noon, returning same evening. MANITOBA has to face the increasing necessity of providing for lunatics within its bounds. Twenty-five of such afflicted persons are now confined in one prison, which is cause for the prompt measures being taken to provide proper shelter and care for them and their fellow-sufferers of the present and future in that province. THE Montreal Local Government is resolved to test the constitutionality of the new business tax on public companies without delay. One hundred and fifty-four actions were entered to-day against banks, insurance, Credit Foncier, navigation, telephone, telegraph, railway, and all other companies who have not paid the impost. THE flower gardens in the city are now at their best, and add much to the picturesque quality of our not over picturesque city. The love for flowers has grown very much in the city during the past few years, and it is to be hoped that it will continue to grow. Nothing is more pleasant to the eye, and so elevating to the taste, than the sight of a garden in the gorgeousness of full-bloom. THIS huge Suro tunnel which has been run under the mountains to form an escape channel for the hot water of the Comstock Mines, of Virginia City, Nevada, is now completed. The tunnel is four miles long and the water is conveyed through it into a pine flume, made close to prevent the escape of vapor. The temperature of the water is 195°, and three million gallons are discharged every twenty-four hours. THE Mail says:—"In reading the account of the reception of the American Science Association at Quebec, we are left under the melancholy conviction that most of the men when they had to face the address, had not had any breakfast. They probably felt like Alexander the Great, who interrupted a proxy mayor (or his like in Greece) by saying, 'My friend, you have probably dined; Alexander has not.' But no deaths from starvation have been recorded. THE trotting season in the United States this year is most interesting, and many new and good horses have come on the turf. Important meetings took place at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and Charter Oak Park, Hartford, within the past fortnight. In the 2.19 class at the last mentioned place, "Fannie Witherspool" by Almont won first money, and at Poughkeepsie "Aldine" another of Almont's get, won the 2.25 class race. A race took place on Wednesday last, at Charter Oak Park between "Clington" and "Edwin Thorne" for \$3,000. "Edwin" was the winner in 2.19, though "Clington" took the first heat in 2.17. AN East Point correspondent, "Saottie," writes us a letter complaining that on account of the arrangements of the Caledonian games, the country people were obliged to leave town before the distinctively Scottish part of the programme was performed, viz: the "Gillie Callum" Sword Dance, and Bag Pipe competition; and he also wished to enjoy the fun of the hurdle and sack racing, which came too late for the people leaving by the afternoon train.
