WERE LEFT BEHIND.—Two American seamen of the Gloucester fishing schooner Hayward, Capt. Roberts, arrived at Halifax by steamer St. Pierre, on Wednesday morning, in a destitute condition and reported to the United States consul-general. They went ashore at Cape Royal on leave, and during their absence the vessel put to sea without any apparent good reason. The matter will be enquired into.

A GOOD SHOWING.—An Ottawa dispatch says: The minister of finance has received a letter from Marples & Jones, large commission merchants, Liverpool, in which they refer to the exhibit of the Royal Lancashire show, as follows: "At one stall we had samples of Canadian creamery butter and merchants generally spoke highly of the quality. We have several enquiries for considerable quantities to be held over in Canada till September and October. It is generally believed in trade that Canadian butter is steadily gaining ground here and our exhibit of Canadian eggs has proved beyond doubt, that if properly handled they can be brought forward even at midsummer and sold in perfect condition here."

THE GILLIS PROPERTY.—A few days ago we chronicled the fact that the land on which Mr. Gillis' boarding stable stood was sold to L. E. Prowse for \$1200. Mr. Gillis, however, failed to find a purchaser for the building, buyers probably being somewhat intimidated by the late trouble over the moving of the Ch'town Hospital. The result is that Mr. Gillis is having the building torn down. The destruction of this building removes one of the old landmarks. It was originally built and used by the Baptists as a place of worship, remaining as such until the erection of the Baptist Brick Church. Thereafter the building served partly as a warehouse and partly as a magistrate's court, presided over by the late Alex. Hayden, Esq. Later it was in use as a livery stable, and finally as a boarding stable.

MONCTON'S HEALTH.—A recent despatch says: Moncton is rapidly becoming one of the healthiest towns in the maritime provinces. There were only 12 deaths there in August, this year, as compared with 24 in August, 1891, and taking the three months ending August there have been only 32 deaths this year, as compared with 49 last year. In the three months last year there were thirteen deaths from contagious diseases; this year none. Last year forty-four cases of contagious disease were reported, of which nearly a third were fatal; in the three months this year only thirty-three cases were reported, none fatal. Twenty-five cases of typhoid fever were reported in the three months last year; this year only thirteen. Last year two cases of diphtheria; this year none. Last year eight cases measles; this year seven. There is an increase in the three months this year in the cases of scarlet fever, 13 against four. Medical men say that there are fewer cases of lung disease in Moncton than in any place of equal population in the province.

Twasit Theological.

SIN.—Last night the wonted stillness of the hallway going into the basement of the Brick Methodist Church was broken by the sound of voices in angry debate. Investigation showed, however, that the question under discussion was not theological in its character, but rather the opposite. It seems that the junior had attempted to prevent one of our embryonic lawyers looking through the crack of the door at the people assembled inside. This interference with sacred rights was promptly resented, hence the wordy battle. THE CHOLERA.

The Cold Weather Stopping its March.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The steamer Ironopolis, hailing from Middleboro, has been quarantined at the Crimean seaport Kertch. Eleven of the crew were stricken with cholera; two have died.

PARIS, Sept. 10. Sixty-three cases of cholera and forty-nine deaths were reported here yesterday.

LISBON, Sept. 10. The Portuguese Government has officially declared the ports of Swansea and Plymouth England infected with cholera, and ordered that all vessels arriving from those places be subject to a strict medical examination and then be quarantined for a certain period.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10. McWilliams wires from Father Pt. "Signalled the German steamer Wandrahm below and have just received in reply from her at Matane, saying "all well." This will dispose of the rumor about their being sick on board this vessel.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10. The cold weather is subduing the cholera throughout Russia, except in the Ukraine district.

TEHERAN, Sept. 10. The mortality from cholera now averages 21 daily, against 200 a week ago.

HAMBURG, Sept. 10. The weather has been bright and there has been a cool breeze. The decrease in the number of fresh cholera cases and deaths continues.

HALIFAX, Sept. 10. The 245 race yesterday was won by E. Ica Morgan in three straight heats. Rampart, Jr., was second and Young Clay third. Sim was fourth in the second heat and distanced in the third. The free-for-all was won by Eddie Wilkes in three straight heats; Dot second, Israel third. Dot, Eddie Wilkes and Israel lowered their records. One heat was trotted in 2:27.

An Apostolic Delegate

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. The Catholic News has a cable from Rome stating that the Pope has appointed Archbishop Satolli as Apostolic delegate to the United States. The Archbishop will soon leave Rome for the States with Mgr. O'Connell, and will visit all the dioceses in the country.

Riot at Teheran.

TEHERAN, Sept. 10. This city has been the scene of a serious riot, during which the mob fiercely attacked and captured the local prison and liberated the prisoners. A number of the jailors were killed by the rioters.
