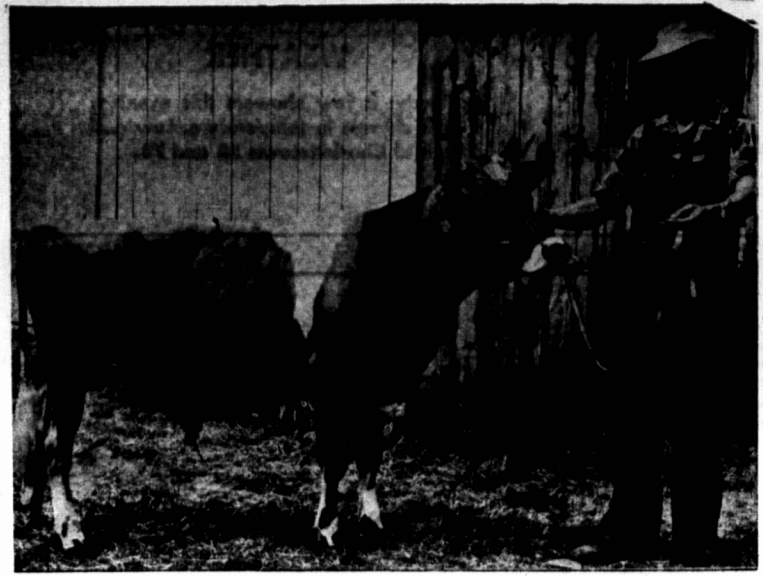

The program involves removal of an estimated 34,000 cubic yards of harbor bottom and construction of new dock facilities, a breakwater and a breakwater extension to reduce wave action and underflow.

A spokesman for T. C. Gorman and Sons of Halifax, one of two contracting firms, said work is more than 50 per cent completed on a 175-foot extension to a breakwater off Graveyard Point at the western side of the harbour.

Work is expected to start in October on a second breakwater, 1,150 feet long and 35 to 45 feet wide.

Meanwhile a drill scow owned by J. P. Porter Co., Ltd., of Montreal, has arrived to fulfill a contract for a \$1,048,000 dredging job in the harbor with completion scheduled by 1960.
