000 to \$1,150,000. Total revenue last year was \$48,500,000. The budget estimate for the current year was \$40,700,000.

Mr. Macdonald did not state specifically the amount of increased tax on theatres, liquor and amusements, but declared the gasoline levy will be up two cents a gallon to 15.

"Here, as in the case of liquor, had we imposed a sale tax of, say, two per cent on gasoline, the cost would have gone up by just about one cent a gallon.

"The increase for the rest of this year will bring us in something in the neighborhood of \$800,000 to \$900,000.

"...taking this figure, and considering the reduction in the expenditure we propose to make, we can substantially reduce, though I do not say that we can wholly eliminate the deficit for the current year."

The Premier said that when the estimates were prepared "it seemed as if we would be given the right to impose a sales tax in the Province" but this had been foiled by the failure to make the necessary amendment to the B.N.A. and by the Federal Government's increase of sales and other taxes.

As the act now stands the Provinces cannot levy indirect taxes and "the view of Ottawa seems to be that unless all the Provinces agree to the proposed amendment the Federal Government will not pass it."

"I never for a moment expected that the Federal Government would increase its own sales tax... had I known, then the suggestion that the Provinces might impose an indirect sales tax would not have interested me in the slightest. "... it is quite true that five out of the 10 Provinces have a direct sales tax. But it is one thing to introduce a direct sales tax in a Province in 1950, 1958 or 1959, or some such time, and a totally different thing to attempt to introduce a sales tax now in 1951 when the Dominion has added 25 per cent to the sales tax burden, and has also added... other taxes."

Attorney-General Patterson introduced a bill to boost long-distance telephone toll rates. Now fixed at five cents per call, they will be increased to five cents for each 50 cents of the toll charge, or part of 50 cents. No new legislation is necessary for liquor, recently increased by the Government. Premier Macdonald said "several hundred thousand dollars from this source" is expected, giving rise to the belief that new hoists are in prospect. Amusement taxes, apparently not yet definitely fixed, would affect such things as hockey, baseball and harness racing pari-mutuels.

Savings Planned For savings in expenditures, the Government will slash spending in several departments. A \$200,000 grant to Annapolis Valley apple growers will not be repeated next year and farmers will be asked to carry heavier costs of limestone, now financed largely by the Government. In education, the rural high school program will be re-studied although current commitments will not be affected, the Premier said. Farms may be increased on a certain car ferries to lighten the load on the Highways Department.

Crop Report

OTTAWA, June 12 (CP) - Completion of seeding has been delayed in the Maritimes during the last two weeks by wet weather, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today in its weekly crop review. Features, hay and early seeded crops are making excellent progress. Some frost damage has occurred to small fruits in the Annapolis Valley but prospects for the apple crop are good. Outlook for stone fruits is poor. Seeding is nearly finished in Quebec Province and crops appear to be progressing favorably. Warmer weather is needed throughout the Province and some areas need rain. Cool nights have retarded cereal growth and light frosts in scattered sections have caused some slight damage. The hay crop promises to be abundant throughout Quebec with the possible exception of some localities south of Montreal. Orchards and vegetable gardens are in better-than-average condition. Tobacco and other industrial crops are progressing normally.

ELECTORS OF QUEEN'S COUNTY

For the information of those electors who have no opportunity of examining the Dominion Election Act, and especially the provisions thereof relating to corrupt and illegal practices, this space will be used daily to publish the main sections of the statute dealing with such practices.

The following are extracts from the Dominion Election Act: 65. Every person is guilty of the corrupt practice of bribery and of an indictable offence against this Act punishable as in this Act provided, who

(f) directly or indirectly, by himself or by any other person on his behalf, on account of and as payment for voting or for his having voted or for illegally agreeing or having agreed to vote for any candidate at an election, or on account of and as payment for his having illegally assisted or agreed to assist any candidate at an election, applies to such candidate, or to his agent or agents, for the gift or loan of any money or valuable consideration, or for the promise of the gift or loan of any money or valuable consideration, office, place or employment, for himself or for the promise of any office, place or employment; or

(g) before or during any election, directly or indirectly by himself or by any other person on his behalf, receives, agrees or contracts for any money, gift, loan or valuable consideration, office, place or employment, for himself or for any other person, for voting or agreeing to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain from voting at any election;

Provided always that the terms of this section shall not extend or be construed to extend to any money paid or agreed to be paid for or on account of any expenses legally payable and bona fide incurred at or concerning any election, and provided that the actual personal expenses of any candidate and his expenses for professional services actually performed and for the fair cost of printing and advertising and for halls or rooms for the holding of meetings shall be held to be expenses legally payable.
