South America Takes Lead In Tuna Match

WEDGIESPORT, N.S., Sept. 14 — (CP) — South America took it away today in opening battles of the seventh international tuna cup matches on the currents of nearby Soldier's Rip.

Official scoring gave Chile 852 points. The Latin-American team collected a point a pound for the weight of its fish — 602 pounds — 200 points for the biggest fish of the day, and another 50 points for being one of the four teams to land a bluefin. Ordinarily, the team landing the most tuna would be awarded 200 points but since no team caught more than one today they were each awarded 50 points.

Argentina, Chile, Brazil and Cuba left teams from the United States, the British Empire and a combined squad from Denmark and Sweden standing as the classic got underway in good weather. It will last three days.

Argentina had the honor of landing the first fish, Chile, a new entry in the tournament that began 13 years ago, wasn't far behind. There were no big fish, as tuna go, but all were at fighting weight around the quarter ton mark.

Arturo Llavalot of Buenos Aires snubbed the first catch in short order. Then came a nifty job by Pedro P. Kohly of Havana, member of the Cuban team which won the tournament twice in other years. Mapel Pena of Santiago went to work in a casual way to bring home the tuna steak for the new Chilean team. Jorge Prado of Sao Paulo came out the winner in a bitter struggle to beat a bluefin for the Brazilian outfit.

The other teams had to be content with a few that got away. But because they are all anglers from away back they weren't surprised at the caprice of lady luck.

George C. Thomas of Los Angeles, skipper of the defending champion United States squad, said "You have heard of fishermen's luck. But there are two kinds of fishermen's luck — good and bad". The U.S. won the tournament in the last two years.

The British team, made up of members from England, Bermuda, Australia and Canada, took an equally optimistic view. The Denmark, Sweden anglers making their tournament debut, said they were delighted that a hurricane which raked the Atlantic coast Tuesday apparently won't affect the fishing seriously.

Talk Lamotta, Dauthuille Return Match

DETROIT, Sept. 14 — (AP) — Jake Lamotta's desperation knockout of France's Laurent Dauthuille with 13 seconds to go and the world midweight title flying across the sea has stirred talk of a rematch.

Andre Barraud, Dauthuille's French manager, said that "if Lamotta is a sportsman he'll give Laurent a return bout very soon."

Ringsiders still were wondering why Dauthuille, leading on all three official cards, chose to swap punches with Jake in the 15th and final round.

It seems trainer Heinle Blaustein of Baltimore told him to "run" and Barraud advised him to "fight like a champion." Laurent, understanding no English, may have got his orders mixed.

World Series Dates Selected

CINCINNATI, Sept. 14 — (AP) — Major league baseball today completed the preliminary arrangements and set the dates for the 1950 World Series — if there are no ties in either pennant race.

That "if" looms as a big word in view of the neck-and-neck race among Detroit, New York and Boston for the American League flag.

If the season ends according to schedule Sunday, Oct. 1, the series will open Wednesday, Oct. 4, in the home park of the National League winner.

If two teams tie in the American League, a one-game playoff will be necessary and Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler said that would mean a one-day delay in the start of the series.

If three teams tie in the American or if there is a tie in the National League, the start of the Series will be delayed even more.

Those latter "ifs" weren't even considered at today's meeting.

The National League has a best-of-three game system for deciding playoffs and Chandler pointed out a deadlock necessarily would mean a series delay of at least two days.

Just how the American League would go about settling a three-team tie would have to be decided by that League itself.
