

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

RAILWAY NEWS.—All the track is reported clear except the Boston branch, and trains are all on time except those on the latter branch. The engine and snow-plough went off the track at Harmony this morning.

HIS LEG INJURED.—A man named Daniel Connolly fell into a trench or drain on Weymouth Street, near Dorchester Street, a few days ago, and had his left leg dislocated and his leg otherwise injured. He is under the care of Dr. Kelly.

MARRIAGES IN NOVA SCOTIA.—According to vital reports published by the Nova Scotia provincial secretary, 1,455 marriage licenses were issued during the nine months ending 30th September, 1893. During the same period 1,246 licenses which had been issued were received back from the clergy through the issuers. The number of marriages by banns was 154.

POLICE COURT.—The hearing of the two charges of violating the Liquor Regulation Act preferred against George Carver was adjourned until Friday, to enable the prosecutor to produce further evidence. The one witness examined this morning admitted being on Carver's premises during the prohibited hours, but was not able to remember whether or not he had purchased intoxicants there. A young man was fined \$8 or 40 days for assault.

SUCCESSFUL ISLAND CONTRACTOR.—The Halifax City Times contains a description of the new county bridge across the south fork of the St. Ann's river, the bridge at Hildersbrand's across the north fork, and the Halifax city bridge. The first and last mentioned bridges cost the county something like \$28,000, and, as the Times says, are "a credit to Mr. A. B. Palmer, the contractor who put them up." Mr. Palmer is a son of Donald W. Palmer, Esq., of Victoria.

SCOURGE AT HALIFAX.—A man named Paul Anderson, 24 years of age, committed suicide at Halifax on Friday night by shooting himself in the right temple with a revolver. Anderson was an insurance agent and had been troubled with his head through a fall down a well about 10 years ago. He underwent several operations and seemed better, but latterly showed symptoms of mental aberration. The case was committed to the custody of his father, who is a messenger of the Merchants' Bank.

A French retired naval officer, it is said, has invented a rifle that is capable of firing two kinds of explosive bullets. These bullets have immense power of penetration, and one hundred of them weigh only 1,200 grammes.

Longevity is by no means a thing of the past in England. The average age of the persons whose obituaries appeared in the London Times during the course of a whole week last month was between 80 and 86 years, and such a record is said to be not uncommon.

According to the law of Holland a man cannot be punished for kissing a strange lady in the streets against her wish. The Appeal Court at Amsterdam has just decided that to kiss a person cannot be an offence, as it is in the nature of a warm mark of sympathy.

Mrs. Celia Rivers, of Henderson, Ky., has been convicted of bigamy by the Simpson County Court at Franklin, Ky. She is but eighteen years of age, and has been married to the fourth husband within the past two years without having secured a divorce from any of them, and all are alive.

White horses are to be barred from military service in Germany. The Emperor has ordered that no more be purchased for the army, and those now in use are to be sold. He thinks that in a war white horses would be especially conspicuous because of the use of smokeless powder, and would afford an easy mark for the enemy.

The number of women writers, editors, and journalists in the United Kingdom is very much smaller than one would expect—only 600, against 5,111 men. There are fourteen women journalists between the ages of fifteen and thirty-five, and twenty above thirty-five.

A widowers' association has been formed in Dresden. No man can join unless his wife is dead, and if he marries again he becomes an honorary member only. One of the chief purposes of the association is to help newly-made widowers by looking after their wives' funerals and caring for their children. Members will also meet for mutual sympathy and entertainment. There are at present 40 members.

Sir Edward Watkin, the great English railroad magnate, has put forth the serious proposition of a canal across Ireland to make a more direct road for transatlantic steamers to Liverpool. The proposition has been completed with the discussion of a tunnel between Scotland and Ireland. Sir Edward claims that both the tunnel and ship canal could be built for \$100,000,000.

Three of the most important railroads in Russia were taken by the Government last month, to be operated henceforth as state properties. These were to have been taken in 1900, but for some reason not made public the government decided not to wait till that time. The roads are the St. Petersburg-Moscow, Moscow-Nijni-Novgorod, and St. Petersburg-Warsaw.

Adelaide, during December, the thermometer several times registered over 100 degrees in the shade, and one day it climbed to 107 in the shade and 163 in the sun.
