The eyes of the trading world
will be on the U.S. Congress
on the new year to see
whether it will continue on a path
of free trade or take a protectionist
detour.
Specifically, congress will deal
with an administration proposal
of a five-year extension of the
general Trade Agreement
including authority to cut
tariffs by 25 per cent over the
next five years, but with a maximum
of 10 per cent in any one
year.
This proposal originally passed
in 1948. It has been renewed from
time to time since. The act was
passed in 1955 and, unless re-
newed, will expire this coming
year.

Ship Is Busy Lifting Buys

All navigation buoys in the
Northumberland Straits west of
Point Prim to Exumacina and
along the north coast of Prince
Edward Island from North Point
to North Lake have now been lifted
for the winter months.
This was announced Tuesday af-
ternoon by Major E.K. MacNutt,
local Marine Agent for the De-
partment of Transport.
The C.S. survey vessel, Wed-
nesday to commence lifting the
buoys in areas along the west coast
of Cape Breton and those in the
vicinity of the Magdalen Islands.
Mr. MacNutt said that the buoys
from East Point, P.E.I. to Char-
lottetown and the larger lighted
and sound buoys in the Picot
area are still in position. "These",

sitions so long as the weather
condition permit."
In the immediate harbor area
of Georgetown, Murray Harbor
and Picot, the S.C.S. Brant is
presently engaged in lifting small
