THE BATTLE IN NORTH ONTARIO.

The (Grip) plan of campaign seems to have been drafted by Mr. Tait. At all events, it was the work of an expert in political strategy. Mr. Gillespie was nominated as Liberal, being a Roman Catholic, it was undoubtedly assumed that his co-religionists would rush headlessly to his support, no matter what his propositions on fiscal and other questions might happen to be. THE RETURN TO OLD-ENGLISH EXPRESSION.

Modern historians whose style is strong on the native side—men like Green and Frothingham and Harrison—furnish examples of the influence upon personal diction of delvings in the by-gone life and language. A glance at some modern poets may be taken, to strengthen the impression; and no man can flatter head the list than William Morris, whose verse is notable in this matter of good old English. I draw on his great story-cycle, "The Earthly Paradise," a stanza from "The Man Born to be King":

"So long he rode bedrowe anigh a sun upon the river, and aro that seemed a goodly place to him; For o'er the gully smooth mid-head the wind upon the apples growed in. And many an ancient apple tree Within the orchard could he see. Shook to the great when's measured clack And grumble of the gear within: 'Whither the red fire dulleth the din The doves sat cooling half the day, And round the half-cut stack of hay The sparrows fluttered twittering'."

We have chosen this earlier unobtrusive example of a happy use of the native English elements in verse rather than one from the later, more pronouncedly archaic, work of Morris, through this richly illustrates the principle. This natural trove may be called a pioneer of the linguistic renaissance when it is remembered that the chief poem-group of his life dates from 1838-70. And with him may properly be set Swinburne; he too exhibits in his verse, in his diction and metres as well, the strong influence upon him of the roots of our speech; he too in his case a softer, more voluptuous effect is gained by the intermingling of classic elements. This renaissance of English, then, silent but steady, for the most part unsensational, but none the less potent, is to be appreciated to-day and in the twentieth century will be more apparent. And the very fact that our leading writers wish to turn back thus to native uses and things, so far as it goes, proof of the race's health, of its solidarity and esprit de corps. We may take comfort in it when confronting an alienism like the urdu; for a general degeneration of the speech would follow any general degeneration of literature; and the testimony of language, just now, directs us to opposite and more cheerful conclusions.—October Forum.
