

Annual Plowing Match Opens Today At Dundas

The thirteenth annual provincial plowing match and livestock show gets underway at Dundas today and will continue through Thursday. The feature events of the 2-day program will be the plowing classes climaxed by the Esso provincial championship class on Thursday, the first and second winners of which will represent the Province as a team in the all Canadian plowing match competition to be held in Coburg, Ontario in October. Last year, Glen Morrissey of Cherry Valley won the feature event.

Besides the many plowing classes, there will also be the famous red and white show which is staged annually. This year, the committee has also added Holstein, Jersey and Shorthorn, which will be of interest to many cattle exhibitors.

Twenty-four horse classes will be presented in the two-day show, climaxed by a stake race for those who know their horses. There will also be sporting events on Wednesday and Thursday.

Last year it was shown that the handicraft building was too small owing to the large number of exhibitors in each of the many classes. This year the committee enlarged the building to twice its original size, and they feel assured that it will accommodate all exhibits. A step-dancing contest will also be staged, and it is expected that Burke's Lads and Lassies will be present for piping and Highland dancing.

The Godfrey Sound System will be used during the two days so

that all the grounds may hear the announced results.
