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Alberton Lady Celebrates Her 95th Birthday

On Monday, June 18th, Miss Kate Woodman of Alberton celebrated her ninety-fifth birthday. With her on that day besides her niece, Miss Catherine Woodman with whom she lives, were two other nieces, Mrs. Webster Metherall of Mill River, and Mrs. Cecil Barbour who, with her husband, motored from Cambridge, Mass., for the occasion. In the evening they were joined by Miss Woodman's rector, Rev. J. R. McMahon, members of St. Peter's W. A., Mr. John Webb of Woodstock who recently celebrated his ninety-third birthday, Mr. Lockerby of Fortune Cove who is eighty-seven, and other friends. Refreshments served to the guests included a beautifully decorated birthday cake with ninety-five candles.

Miss Woodman was born at that part of Alberton South known locally as "The Point", daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Woodman. She and a brother, George, aged 86, now living in Portland, Oregon, are the only surviving members of a family of three girls and five boys.

Mr. and Mrs. Woodman were born in England and before coming to Alberton had lived in Charlottetown and in New Brunswick. From their native land they brought horses, cattle, seeds, etc., as well as household furnishings. At that time the means of winter transportation was a boat on runners. Passengers helped to haul the boat across and when they came to open water all jumped aboard. Mr. Woodman came to Alberton as Cunard's agent and one of his duties was to collect harbour dues from American vessels. Miss Woodman can recall seeing so many American schooners in port that one could walk across the harbour on their decks. In addition to his duties as Cunard's agent, Mr. Woodman collected quit-rents and land taxes. In the days before the railroad was built he travelled to Charlottetown on horseback to deliver these collections and always carried a brace of pistols in case of attempted robbery. Later he was appointed first clerk of the County Court in Alberton.

When Miss Woodman was a child there was no school in what is now Alberton (then only The Crossroads) and most of her education was received during time spent with relatives in New Brunswick. At that time there was a school near the present residence of Don Campbell but in those days of intolerance it was not desirable for a child to walk so great a distance alone.

For the greater part of her life Miss Woodman has lived in Alberton. She has always been regarded as a woman of high principles and keen intellect and an interesting conversationalist. She has been a lover of people and of good books. For a number of years rheumatism has prevented her from leaving the house but she has always been happy and contented and a most hospitable hostess to many friends. To Miss Woodman many friends in extending hearty congratulations and good wishes for continued health and happiness.
