## Two In Hospital After Fire At Summerside

—Two men were taken to hospital for treatment of burns following a fire about 6 a.m. on Saturday which completely gutted the two-room one-storey home of Mr. and Mrs. Amand Arsenault on North Market Street in Summerside, forcing six members of the family to escape through a small window.

The two men in hospital are the owner of the home, Mr. Arsenault, who suffered burns to his back together with having the back of his head singed from the flames; and his father-in-law, Mr. Sylvan Cassie, who suffered burns to both feet.

The two women were still in hospital last evening and reported to be resting comfortably.

The fire is said to have begun in the kitchen stove, and it is believed he mistook a container of high test gas for one of kerosene, causing a sudden combustion which had the house in flames in a moment.

The three adults assisted the three small children from the burning home.

The Summerside Fire Department was summoned but the interior of the house was completely destroyed, together with furniture and clothing of the occupants who did not have time to get fully dressed.

Mr. Arsenault, who moved the house to its present site only a few months ago, had since made extensive repairs and alterations.

It is reported that there was no insurance.—S.

—For travelling Mrs. Gaudet donned a suit of beige and brown with brown accessories and a corsage of Pernet Yellow roses.

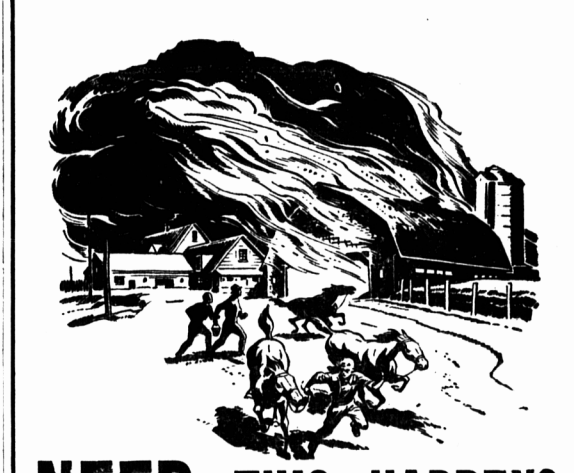
