THE TOURIST SEASON,

With the holidays come the tourists. They are accompanied this year, as usual, by pleasant weather. It is pleasing to note, too, that efforts have been successfully made for their better accommodation in larger numbers. Our steamers are staunch and well provisioned, a credit to the province, and our trains are well up to the standard of those which carry passengers on the mainland. If the cars are somewhat smaller on account of the narrow gauge, they are also cleaner and equally well upholstered. We have heard passengers lately from the mainland express satisfaction and pleasure in consequence of the evident careful sweeping and dusting of the cars of the P. E. Island Railway, as compared with those of the Intercolonial. In most of our hotels and boarding houses, too, improvement is at once apparent. The recently enlarged Hotel Davies affords excellent accommodation for many visitors; and the Queen, The Revere, and other houses in Charlottetown, and the Clifton, the Russ and other houses in Summerside, continue to welcome their customers to all the good things that "The Garden of the Gulf" affords. Throughout the country, too, there are now many hotels, boarding houses and farm houses, where good board and lodging may be obtained.

**A PROMISE AND
HOW IT WAS KEPT!**

WHEN Sir Wilfrid Laurier was seeking office in 1896 he made the following pledge on behalf of himself and his party: "If we get into power, we will follow the example of Mr. Mackenzie; and I say that although we may not be able to bring the expenditures to what they were under him, we can reduce the amount two, yes, three, and Mr. Mills says four, millions of dollars per year."

The Liberal-Conservative Government paid in that year \$36,969,759 in account of ordinary expenditures and \$4,732,624 in account of permanent works,—making, in all, \$41,702,383.

If the Liberal pledge had been fulfilled the total expenditures of the Liberal Government would now be less than \$38,000,000 a year. But they are, in point of fact, upwards of \$60,000,000 a year!

Last year they amounted to \$51,542,635—or \$13,500,000 more than Sir Wilfrid promised they should be.

If it should appear, when the accounts of last year are fully made up, that there was no deficit at the end of the year, the fact will be due, not to the Liberal management, but to the splendid results of the great public works of the Liberal-Conservative party.

This year the Government has asked and obtained authority to expend \$62,029,726, as follows:

Main estimates	\$49,068,391
Supplementaries	7,244,135
Bridges	717,200
Railways	5,000,000

Total, so far \$62,029,726

This big amount does not include the salaries of the three additional Superior Court judges to be appointed in Quebec, or an additional judge in the Yukon, or cold storage, and contingents, estimated at about \$2,700,000.00, and increasing the amount of the year's expenditures to close upon \$65,000,000, or \$27,000,000 more than the Liberal pledge.

than the amount that Sir Wilfrid Laurier pledged himself and his party to expend in the course of a year.

The Liberals have added to the public expenditures at the rate of \$10,700,000 a year—in the face of Sir Wilfrid's promise that they should be reduced two, three or four million dollars a year.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—As a result of recent rains the crops of the Northwest are now growing rapidly, and the fears of hard times next year are dissipated.

—We are indebted to Mr. Frank Pedley Superintendent of Immigration, Ottawa, for copies of the descriptive Atlas of Western Canada and the Canadian Atlas for use in the schools.

—A very highly respected citizen of Charlottetown passed away last evening in the person of Mr. W. W. Stumbles, senior, whose death is one of those of which there is little to regret. He lived an honest and God fearing man, and he died at a good old age. "The memory of the just is blessed."

—By taking over the Bank of British Columbia, the Bank of Commerce will become the second largest bank in Canada, with ramifications extending from end to end of the Dominion, and with offices in every great business centre of the world. Nine millions will be the par value of the authorized capital. The two banks are prosperous institutions, and together they will do a vast business under the able presidency of Senator Cox, and the equally able management of Mr. B. E. Walker. With the merging of the Bank of British North America into the Bank of Commerce, a bank with a royal charter disappears. The former bank received its franchise in England many years ago—before Confederation, in fact. Its shareholders are chiefly residents of the British Isles. All over the Pacific coast it does a great business, which the Bank of Commerce will now have.

—Speaking of the enormous estimates the Farmers' Sun says:—"It would be idle for anyone to attempt to prove that in this case performance is in harmony with promise. The figures show on their face the extent of the Liberal apostasy. The Government has apparently concluded that the people want to be bought, and has decided that they shall have no occasion to dicker over the price. Many an old-time Liberal will wish that the Sir Richard Cartwright of old were in the House of Commons to flay the Government. The Government may in its course secure the support of corrupted voters and of venal interests, but they will lose the support of many a Liberal, who, with out hope or desire for personal reward, spared neither time nor effort in 1896 to secure the triumph of his party's cause."
