DRIVERLESS ENGINE.

LONDON, May 16.—A locomotive ran from Ascot to Egham late on Thursday night without a driver or fireman on board. It pulled up at the latter place because it steam was exhausted, and the vacuum brakes were applied automatically. The engine, which was engaged in shunting at Ascot, was made to push some trucks into a siding, but the brakes on the trucks were not put on, and the latter, being on an inclined section of the line, began to back towards the engine. A collision was feared and the men on the engine jumped clear. Telephone communication was set up along the line, all the level crossings were opened, and the engine finally stopped as stated, seven miles from its starting point, without mishap. The shunted trucks which were the origin of the affair were stopped before they had travelled many yards.

The question of how to stop a runaway engine was raised in the Times on January 16, when the explosion of the boiler of a locomotive travelling between St. Pancras and Southend blew the driver from the footplate, and injured the fireman. The accident raised a discussion on the possibility of driverless trains dashing past signals to destruction, and railway experts agreed that no such event was likely. One of the precautions to meet such a case is the arrangement that the vacuum brake can be operated by the driver or the guard, and one of the duties of the guard is to see that at important points and when approaching the terminus of the line the train does not pass signals against it.
