New Site For Toronto Stock Exchange Undecided

The Toronto Stock Exchange, now located on Bay Street, probably will be in a new home sometime in the early 1960s, but just where that home will be has not been decided.

Last June the exchange acquired the site on King Street East formerly occupied by the offices of Imperial Oil Ltd., with the aim of building the new exchange there.

However, other sites are still being considered and the final decision, it is understood, may ultimately tie in with some pretty important real estate developments in Toronto's downtown financial area.

Reporting to a meeting of the exchange last week, James G. K. Strathy, chairman of the board of governors, said:

A number of proposals concerning the use of King Street and other downtown sites have been placed before the board, but none has proceeded beyond initial discussion, with the exception of a submission from one group, which it is hoped will be available for presentation about the time of the exchange's annual meeting in May.

Says Patronage Seen In Parks

OTTAWA (CP) — CCF Leader Coldwell Monday accused the government of political patronage in the hiring of workers in national parks.

His accusation in the Commons was based on a statement by Resources Minister Alvin Hamilton. The minister later insisted that hirings are done through the national employment service.

The exchange was touched off when Henry Murphy (L — Westmorland) asked how men were being hired at Fundy National Park in New Brunswick under a new program of expanding winter work in the parks.

Mr. Hamilton, responsible for national parks, said the "usual policy of the past" was followed.

When asked by Mr. Coldwell to elaborate, he said that at the Fundy park the superintendent, when hiring men, consults "with the people he thinks would have the proper advice to give."

Mr. Coldwell asked whether that means the political organization supporting the government. When he got no reply, he asserted: "That's precisely what it means."

Launches Drive To Boost Winter Employment

OTTAWA (CP) — Labor Minister Starr Monday launched the national winter employment campaign with a plea that renovation, maintenance and repair jobs be started now rather than in the spring.

"All of us are inclined to look on spring as the time for undertaking all sorts of jobs... but it is obvious to anyone who wishes to think about it that this is poor business, not only for businessmen and industrialists, but also individual homeowners," the labor minister said in a statement.

"We can reasonably expect to get a better job done, and often a more economical one, if we hire men and buy materials now when they are most readily available in the winter, instead of trying to compete for them next summer when construction again reaches its peak."

Mr. Starr said about 178,000 construction workers now are unemployed and predicted this will grow "in traditional fashion" during the coming weeks of severe winter weather unless a serious attempt is made to break from traditional ideas.

He added an estimated \$300,000,000 is lost annually in Canada as a result of seasonal layoffs between Nov. 15 and April 15. Unemployment insurance payments between Dec. 1, 1956 and April 30, 1957 totalled more than \$169,000,000. This figure will be larger this year, he said.
