Chest X-Ray Drive To Be Continued Next Week

The response by the people of Charlottetown and vicinity to the chest X-ray drive, currently being held in Charlottetown by the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League, has exceeded all expectations and as a result the supply of film for the X-rays has been exhausted. It was announced last night by Arthur M. Clark, president of the League.

A rush order to Halifax yesterday for more film was stymied by adverse weather conditions. Mr. Clark said, and has forced the unit to shut down for the remainder of this week. However, the offices will be open all next week, and again the staff has consented to keep the unit operating on Thursday evening for those who cannot get their X-ray during the day.

Mr. Clark went on to say that nearly 800 people had taken X-rays in the less than four days since the drive was inaugurated. It was expected that many more people take advantage of the hours that the unit was to be in operation yesterday evening had the film supply held out.

The president indicated that he was very pleased with the response and hoped that the people who had planned on having their X-ray last evening and today would return next week. The unit is located at 84 Kent St., across from the C.F.C.Y. studios. For times that the unit will be in operation next week check the advertising section of this paper Monday.

Principal's Report For Queen Square School Year

"It is my privilege to present this brief report on the activities of Queen Square School for the year 1955-1956," said Mr. Len McDonald at the beginning of his report.

School opened on September 6, with an enrollment of 834. Later enrollments increased this figure to 846. During the year 48 boys left school—31 moving out of the district or Province, and 17 left for work, etc. It is noted that the majority of those quitting school left in grades VIII and IX. Most of these boys could have finished grade X, provided they had studied.

Because there are only 22 class rooms for 26 classes, it was necessary to operate on a shared basis during the year. Grades 11 to V followed this program until Easter, when the grades 1 and 11 continued this part time program. We heartily dislike this necessary arrangement, and hope that arrangements can be made for another year to relieve this situation, until the proposed new High School is completed.

ology. These girls have now returned home, and one was sent to the Souris Hospital and the other girl is now working here at the Montague Hospital.

"We have placed Lab Technicians in Hospitals before, but these are the first two girls who have been trained in X-Ray technique as well."

"This year we have taken nurses from the smaller hospitals and paid their expenses to take specialized training in Maternity Work. One of the Nurses at this hospital took advantage of that course and is now back in charge of the Maternity Department of the Hospital."

"In May, of this year, we changed our programme as far as free diagnosis of Cancer was concerned. Up until May, if the people of this Province wished to take advantage of this free service, they had to go to hospitals in Charlottetown or Summerside in order to get free hospitalization. But since May they can be admitted to any hospital in the Province, if the hospital has, in the opinion of the Director of Cancer Control, the necessary facilities to carry out the procedure necessary to rule out or confirm a diagnosis. In these cases, the patient's hospital bill will be paid at ward rates for a maximum period of three days, which is considered long enough to make a diagnosis."

COOKING COURSE "In July of this year, the Department of Health is sponsoring a cooking course for the cooks in our hospitals, in order to give them a better understanding of the preparation of food for the patient and the preparing of special diets."

"Most of the hospitals throughout the Province are taking advantage of this opportunity."

"On July 1st of this year we are expanding our Laboratory services to the people of our Province and to our hospitals."

"All Laboratory tests that are referred to our Lab by private doctors, after July 1st, will be done free of charge to the doctors; the expenses involved, which are large, will be borne by the Department of Health. Besides this service to private doctors, our Department will pay for most of the Lab procedures that cannot be carried out by our hospital technicians, and that are referred to our Central Laboratories, as a part of the charge will be sent like a small item, but when one realizes that it now costs \$6.25 for one tissue examination, you can realize the over-all saving to our hospitals and our people."

"Now with this vast expansion in the Health Department within the last year in relation to hospitals, you can see how the Health Department and the hospitals are becoming more and more inseparable, and the administration of each is becoming a bigger and more complicated task year by year."

"And in this regard the Boards of Governors, the Ladies Auxiliaries, the Ladies Aid, and the other organizations associated with hospitals deserve a great deal of praise and commendation for their ceaseless work for the betterment of our hospitals, with a commendation to them selves. Without these community-minded citizens, no hospital would survive."
