Former Ch'town Man Killed in Mine Near Uranium City



Relatives and friends here and elsewhere, were shocked and saddened to receive the tragic news that Robert Freeman Eddy, 45-year-old East Bathurst native, was instantly killed on March 4. An employee of Eldorado Mining and Refining Ltd., Mr. Eddy was at work on the firm's Beaverlodge operations when the accident occurred and a companion died with him.

The men, cleaning out after drilling and blasting, were making a floor, in a new slope on the act shaft's second level, about 200 feet underground. When they removed one of two main supports, layers of rock broke loose from the ceiling, killing both instantly. The cause of the accident is five miles from Uranium City, Saskatchewan. An inquest is being conducted.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Amos Eddy, Mr. Eddy had been away from Bathurst for the past 29 years. He had resided in various centres including Philadelphia, Pa., Timmins, Ont., Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Edmonton, Minn. and Eldorado, Saskatchewan. A veteran of the Second World War, he served overseas with the R.C.A.F. and other affiliations included the Masonic Lodge, Personable, kind and clever, he was widely popular and will be much missed and mourned.

Mr. Eddy was a dog fancier and while operating the Eddy Kennels in Prince Edward Island he served as president of the Charlottetown Kennel Club.

Mr. Eddy is survived by his wife and four sisters, Mrs. Lockard Ronalds (Mabel), and Mrs. Lillian McCarthy, both of East Bathurst; Mrs. T. D. Morrison, (Emma), Summerside, P. E. I.; Mrs. Arthur Palmer (Sally) Glendale, California; two brothers, Kenneth Eddy, Detroit, Mich., and Eldon W. Eddy, Bathurst, predeceased him.

The remains were brought to Bathurst, the service being conducted in First United Church Chapel by Rev. E. R. Woodside. Hymns sung by the choir were "Unto The Hills," and "Abide With Me," the same as chosen for the funerals of the other members of the family who had passed on before him. Among those from a distance attending the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Morrison, D. R. Morrison, all of Summerside; Mr. and Mrs. Harold Saunders of Charlottetown.

U.K. Supply Minister To Tour Canada

OTTAWA, (CP)—British Supply Minister Duncan Sandys will make a three-week tour of Canada next month to "get acquainted" with Canadian defence production and installations.

Officials here said Mr. Sandys, who will fly to Ottawa April 9, is not coming to undertake specific negotiations. His visit was announced in London Sunday. Mr. Sandys will confer in Ottawa with Defence Production Minister Howe and Defence Minister Claxton. He will visit military installations and defence production centres in Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Ont., Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

H & S Executive Monthly Meeting

The monthly meeting of the executive of the P. E. I. Federation of Home and School Associations was held in Charlottetown on March 22, in Mr. K. Parker's office, with the president, Mrs. Gordon MacDonald presiding.

Reports of officers and committee conveners were heard and discussed. Signs of an increasing interest in education in the province were noted. The number of visitors to schools during Education Week this year was much larger than in previous years. One city school reported over 200 and another 150 visitors.

Eskimo Life Not Too Easy

NEW YORK, (CP)—Despite the possible first impression that the primitive life of the Eskimo is ideal, it falls short in some important respects, Resources Minister Jean Lesage of Canada said Saturday.

Lesage told a luncheon meeting of the Canadian Women's Club of New York city the Eskimos live together in harmony, adapting themselves skillfully to their surroundings by developing the clothing and equipment best suited to the harsh northern climate.

But the Eskimos are dependent on imported goods to fill many of their needs, the minister added. While they received the same family allowances and old-age pensions as other Canadians, their principal source of revenue to pay for these imports was the sale of furs.

Since hunting conditions were not always good and the cost of imports in the north was high, the Eskimo's life was never easy.

Mounting Hospital Costs Discussed By Blue Cross

MONCTON, N. B., Mar. 28—(Special)—Increased hospital costs are being reflected in the operation of Maritime Blue Cross, but the overall financial picture is satisfactory and no immediate increase in present subscriber rates is contemplated. This was announced over the week-end following the 11th annual meeting of the Maritime Hospital Service Association, (Blue Cross-Blue Shield), held in the board room of the Association's new administration building on MacBeath Avenue here.

"Mounting hospital costs are under constant study by our agencies and appropriate action will be taken when indicated as necessary to safeguard the fiscal position of our plan," stated J. N. Flood, M.E.I.C., president of John Flood and Sons Ltd., Saint John, who was re-elected chairman of the plan's board of directors. These increased hospital costs, he went on, meant that Blue Cross benefits were currently worth at least ten per cent more than last year; were, in fact, representative of an extra ten per cent. Benefit to subscribers since January 1st.

Enrolment in Maritime Blue Shield continued to increase during 1953, as did the number of participating doctors in the surgical-medical care plan, the meeting was told by Dr. J. A. McMillan, Charlottetown, executive medical director.

Directors of the plan from the four Atlantic provinces devoted two days, Friday and Saturday, to two executive meetings and the annual meeting.

Wilson was quoted by some American reporters as saying "the possibility of sabotage was not excluded," but there was no direct official confirmation of this remark.

The ill soldiers, all of them bore, Colombo, Aden and Port Said. Most of the women and children had embarked at Singapore.
